





BEHIND THE DOORS OF DECATUR HIGH SCHOOL


PHOTOGRAPHY

JAY THOMAS Salutatorian







A Word About the Play:





13. BOB HALE.





RALPH PIERSON.


Although he made no appearance this season, we are looking forward to two more years of fine play from Ralph. Though he had very little previous experience, he has the size and ability to make a fine letterman.

ELMER MAJOR.


