We wrote a letter to the editor of our local newspaper, read a statement to the city council, which a tape of was broadcast on radio, and informed our members of our support and why. Brochures were sent to everyone in Decatur who pays a water bill by the citizens committee so was not necessary for us to prepare any fact sheets.

(committee work, unit and general membership meetings, subjects covered, membership participation, responses to state and national Times for Action, local action) What has been the main focus of your League's Human Resources work this year?

In May, 1969, at an all member meeting, the committee presented a program on income maintenance. Also in May, a Community Housing Survey of the Decatur metropolitan area was compiled and distributed to local league members.

The Times for Action have received some response. In Oct. and Nov., seventy requests were distributed in the community asking for letters to our Congressmen to support full funding and no crippling amendments to the Economic Opportunity Act of 1969:

The local league has a Decatur Public Schools Committee which has supported an integration plan for the elementary schools which was implemented in the fall of 1969.

At present, a study is underway on public housing in the Decatur community with emphasis on an urban renewal area which has the Housing and Urban Development approval, and which has received some federal funds for the planning stage. In addition to an area scheduled for total clearance and rebuilding, there is an area for spot removal, a recreational area, a park-church complex, and a shopping center.

Scheduled for study is a proposed elderly housing program which would be administered by the local public housing authority.

The Committee will report to the local membership in May, 1970.

> Generally speaking, our local media cover only local activities. Our candidates' questionnaires, primarily because of local candidates and issues, receive excellent newspaper coverage.

Candidates Meetings receive good coverage from all media.

ConCon activities have received good coverage. The State LWV has been mentioned many times by reporters covering

3. Is there a significant difference in the type of story covered by newspapers and radio/TV stations? What has the most appeal for: Newspapers? Television? Radio?

The Newspaper gives best coverage to answers to questionnaires. Our radio stations comentrate on question and answer "Hot Line" shows. We promoted our Candidates Meeting for ConCon delegates in that way - League members answered questions about the Convention, and the election. The TV station presented a panel discussion by the candidates.

There is no significant difference in the type of story covered. Each of the media handle local stories in their own way.

4. Do you prepare special materials for editorial writers? How often was the League mentioned in editorial columns in the past year? (Please enclose clips if possible)

No. (In a conference with the Editor of the Herald and Review, we were informed that the newspaper library contains LWV material.) Never.

5. Does your League sponsor a regular radio or television program or newspaper column? How often does it appear? What kind of materials from the National Office would be helpful?

No. A suggestion for a League question and answer column on ConCon was politely ignored. I don't believe material prepared at the National level would be helpful at this time. Everything must be tied in to a local interest story.

Press releases from National have been passed along to the media (with some slight changes) and have not been used. I feel they serve as valuable background material for the reporters, however, and they are very helpful and worthwhile.

6. Did your League conduct any major public relations programs with other organizations during the past year? If so, please describe.

Community Conversation on WDZ was sponsored by the LWV, and the Decatur Area Council of Churches. The "Conversation" lasts from 6:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. Government officials from all areas of government (Police, State Representatives, Mayor Rupp) talk about their work and answer questions called in by citizens.

A voters Registration drive in a low-income area was sponsored by the LWV and the Responsible Citizens Committee. The County Clerk said it was the first time such a drive had been conducted in a non-election year.

We have most recently cooperated with a Citizens Committee for storm Sewer Improvements. The referendum passed yesterday!

7. What kinds of materials or help do other organizations most often seek from your League -- i.e. speakers, publications, etc.?

Publications such as fact sheets, questionnaires, voters service material.

8. What was your most effective public relations effort of the past year?

Describe.

The previous Public Relations chairman made contact with organizations in the black community and worked with them for voter service projects, with gradually increasing success.

9. Did you utilize any new public relations techniques or tool that proved particularly helpful? If so, please describe.

We have been in touch with Public Relations officers at the various manufacturing plants in Decatur and hope to increase distribution of candidate information, fact sheets, etc. through their bulletin boards or plant newspapers.

### PUBLICATIONS

The Decatur League sends notices of some of the available publications to many local individuals and groups (such as news media, libraries, political parties, schools, city officials), as well as to all contributors. Also, when the budget permits, we give away some publications as a public service to contributors or to specific groups or offices. For example, this year copies of the <u>Illinois Voters Handbook</u> were given to the <u>Library</u> and the County Clerk's office, and a local publication entitled <u>Government Officials and Voting Reference</u> was given to all contributors.

2. What National publication did you find easiest to promote?

Local? State? Why?

Because of the emphasis in Illinois this year on Con Con, most of the literature distributed throughout the community dealt with the Constitutional Convention. We distributed approximately 7000 copies of a sheet entitled The Illinois Constitutional Convention, put out by the LAV of Illinois, which was short, concise, and readable by the general public. This fact sheet was easily distributed through local PTA's, as well as through our own members, and the PTA's were willing to help defray the cost, especially because the price per copy was so low.

There was no single national publication which seemed easier than any other to promote, although the "Facts and Issues" publications have always been popular, perhaps because of their relatively low cost and concise information. School Desegregation: North and South, and Development Aid, Images and Realities were chosen by our League to go out on Subscription Service.

Public Schools-

Study this year was directed at learning about the educational program offered in the Decatur schools. The School Program section of the "School Survey Guide" was used as the basis for interviews and written questions to the administrative staff of the district. In order to evaluate the program offered, we sent a questionnaire to other school districts in Illinois of comparable size or community make-up. This questionnaire used some of those from the Guide. Acompilation was made from this to help members evaluate Decatur schools.

The school committee regularly sends an observer to Board meeting, which are held twice monthly. We are given a copy of the press packet the board supplies, and attach newspaper clippings about the meeting as well as the observer's notes.

The committee organized an all-member meeting Mar. 4th to hear the Superintendent of Schools speak on the district's problems, programs and future. This was informational.

The committee sent a questionnaire to each of the candidates for the School Board election in April, to be distributed to the public as a voter's service.

Action was taken under a support position under our local Water resources - Support for adequate storm and sanitary sewers.

We were asked to be part of a citizen's committee to help support and promote passage of a \$2.600.000 Storm Sewer Bond Issue Referendum. Our president, Water Besources chairman, and a member of her committee represented League and attended four meetings and helped in the planning of the campaign. We wrote a letter to the editor of our local newspaper, read a statement to the city council, which a tape of was broadcast on radio, and informed our members of our support and why. Brochures were sent to everyone in Decatur who pays a water bill by the citizen's consittee so was not necessary for us to prepare any fact sheets.

The referendum, February 24th was a success by a two to one margin. This is the first time a referendum has passed that met an increase in the property tex rate in some time!

- 1. What was your best League experience last year? It is difficult to pinpoint my best League experience as most of year was more exciting, challenging, and rewarding then I could have anticipated much of this due to Con. Con. I gained much from the President's meetings & Structure and Procedure meeting about League as a State and National organization and have tried to pass on my impressions to our board. I feel fortunate to have had an unusually cooperative, concientious, and congenial board to work with.
- 2. What was your worst League experience last year? Probably my worst League experience took place one week after I took office that of having to organize printing & distribution of 3 or 4 thousand each School Board candidates and City Council candidates sheets (information) during a five day Easter vacation period when most of our board members and other usually helpful members were out of town! Our new Voter Service chairman resigned in the middle of this campaign. In fact, refilling this chairmanship as well as several others was very time consuming and frustrating. As stated above, however, we ended up finally with an excellent board.
- 3. How did you involve your members in League action? This is an area where our League could be much stronger much emphasis has always been put on Program study but not enough. I think, on action. However the Con Con committee, themselves, spoke before groups, and distributed much information on Con Con and a few members have been involved in distribution of candidates information for various elections. I have written some condensations of Time for Actions and mailed to members as well as including them in our "Voter" urging them to write. Our Human Resources chairman has also done this. I feel that an Action Chairman is a necessity and am glad you are making it an official portfolic although as of this moment I have not found anyone to take this responsibility but will keep trying!

If so, what change? This past year's board and most League members with whom I have discussed a possibility of change in nonpartisan policy favor liberalizing it and letting board members other then Pres..

Voter Service Chairman use their own disgretion on this. At present, we do not plan to change our policy unless it decided Nationally that we may do so. However, some of our chairmen plan to resign temporarily to back positive thinking school board candidates.

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5. Did your Board have an Orientation with a State Board member this past year? If so, what were the benefits of that orientation? Yes. It is beneficial and stimulating to a local board to meet and commuicate with someone from the state board on a personal basis such as this period! The most important question that we had answered was as to when it is a conflict of interest for a program chairman to be on certain civic committees outside of League. Since orientation with a State board member is scheduled for every other year, I hope to have our communicator come to one of our board meetings early this year.
