The national council directed that there be a simple and fast process for reaching agreement on campaign financing. Our Representative Government position calls for "an open governmental system which is representative and responsive." Such a system requires campaign financing practices which

- -ensure the public's right to know,
- -- eliminate corruption and undue influence, and
- -- enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office.

The initial steps toward achieving such a system are measures which provide for

- -- full disclosure of all campaign contributions and expenditures, and
- --effective monitoring and enforcement by an independent body.

The following broad questions focus on the major problem areas in campaign financing. Your decisions will provide guidance for effective League action.

COMMENTS

All answers to consensus questions are based on the premise that there should be Limitations full disclosure and enforcement.

- 1. a. The majority felt that contributions should not be limited, but a strong minority felt that they should be limited. Majority felt that contributions and expenditures should be considered together and we did so.
 - c. It was recommended that spot announcements be eliminated.
 - d. Majority felt that there should not be a limit on the number of ad hoc committees a candidate may have if there is one central finance campaign committee per candidate through which disclosure of receipts as well as expenditures is made.
 - e. Majority felt that the length of car aigns probably could not be shortened, but we favored setting a later date for primary elections. A minority felt that the length of campaigns should be shortened.

sase of Funding

2. c. We could not reach a consensus here, therefore we must answer undecided.

d. We did favor an equalization of the franking privilege to include the incumbert and the opposition candidate alike and any time limit of such privilege should apply to the candidates equally.

Use of Media

3. It was agreed that some "Voters time" should be mandatory and that the candidates could be encouraged to use their time on issue oriented matters as opposed to personal or emotional matters. This answer applies to the discussion of radio and television, we did not discuss the problems of newspaper and other/publications.

President's Comment.

While there were no objections expressed to any of the statements which served as the introduction and basis for our discussions, one person did point out that this is not our usual method in reaching consensus and that a rather large number of assumptions were made. The key assumptions that full disclosure of all campaign contributions and expensitures, and effective monitoring and enforcement by an independent body are necessary for "an open governmental system which is representative and responsive" would have added only two questions and would have served as an adequate base for the discussion.
