



The proper functioning of a machine, an individual, a group, or a school is maintained by the proper balance of the total.


A school may be well known and admired for excellence in a particular endeavor. The whole school is often geared to that endeavor and may produce individuals lacking in total development.



Clubs and organizations provide time, resources, and opportunities for those with specific interests. Time is also provided for councils, music groups, and honoraries.








SPOTLIGHT SPORTS

Assemblies, dances, plays, and all EHS activities provide opportunities for fun and a change of pace from the daily routine.



ENGLISH

The English department seeks to teach students to achieve a clear and effective style of speaking and writing, to recognize and find inspiration in the expression of great literature, and to grow in understanding of the people and the world around them.

Freshmen concentrate on writing good paragraphs, recognizing parts of speech, and reading short stories, plays, and poems which stimulate thinking about themselves, the American way, and the beauty of the imagination.

Memorizing Mark Antony's funeral oration over Caesar and watching mizerly Silas Marner rejoin the human race are the high points of the sophomore year.

In the junior year, students read literature which closely relates to American history. They continue writing themes, and they do a great deal of individual reading in the library. Seniors survey English literature from Chaucer to Eliot reading Hamlet or MacBeth. They are also given the opportunity to pursue an individual interest by doing extensive research and organizing and writing a research paper.



SCIENCE

Science classes gives the student a better understanding of the ways of living things and enriches his knowledge of this complex age of science. Classes in science also give students opportunity to learn first-hand by performing experiments and observing in laboratories to suppliment the information gained from textbooks and lectures.

In biology the student tries to understand his biological environment and himself. He studies the gamet of life from algae to man. Physical science treats briefly many modern industries and products. An advanced course in physics deals with machines, measurements, and various forms of energy, heat, light, sound, magnetism, and electricity. Chemistry is concerned with atoms, molecules, and the nature of matter elements, and compounds.



the PANTHER PRESS who loaned us pictures, strobes, and help,


the faculty, the administration, and all who gave time, cooperation or inspiration,

CONTRACT CAJOLERY





Panthers Complete 8-7 Season

The 1963 Eisenhower baseball team was composed of eight returning lettermen from the previous state champion team of 1962. Included were all-tourney selections Lee Boyko, Roe Skidmore, and Mickey Dukeman.

The infield consisted of Skidmore at first base, Ron Smith at second base, Boyko at short stop, and Gary Hartman at third base. The catching was handled by Don Crews and Carl Hanson. The outfield was covered mainly by Mickey Dukeman, Mike Ball, Jim Newcome, and Ritchard Wiand. Bob Redpath, Bryan Stockwell, and Dan Ogden did the pitching. Lee Boyko at .373, and Ron Smith at .333 were the team's leading hitters. Bob Redpath had the best won-lost record, 5—4, and the lowest earned run average, 1.65.

The Panthers lost five of their first six games, then recovered to win eight of the next ten, including wins over MacArthur, Stephen Decatur, and St. Teresa for an overall record of eight wins and seven defeats. This was the poorest record that an Eisenhower baseball team has ever had.

With nine returning lettermen, the outlook for the 1964 season seems bright.
