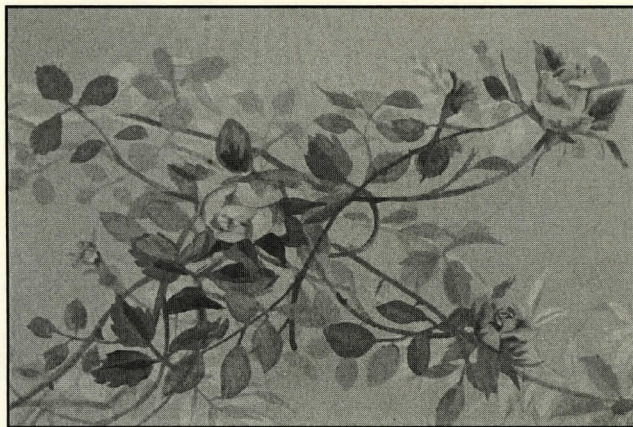
Who would have thought that playing “dice” would find its way into the Homestead! Well, on second thought, Anna brought dice playing into her house. On an extended Europe trip she purchased a wonderful 19th century copy of Bartolme Estaban Murillo’s 17th century painting entitled “Beggar Boys Playing Dice.” This large oil painting hangs on the west wall in the south parlor. We use this painting to be inspired for a fundraiser involving dice.

Bunco was originally “8-Dice cloth,” a dice game in 18th-century England. It was imported to San Francisco as a gambling activity in 1855, where it gave its name to gambling parlors, or Bunco parlors, and more generally to any swindle. After the Civil War the game evolved to a popular parlor game. During the 1920s and Prohibition, Bunco was repopularized as a gambling game, often associated with a speakeasy. Law-enforcement groups raiding these parlors came to be known as “Bunco squads.” Bunco as a family game saw a resurgence in popularity in the 1980s.

We hope you will agree that it is a fun way to raise money for the restoration project. Bunco is purely a game of luck and anybody can learn the rules quickly. Several members of our fundraising committee did not know how to play Bunco, but we found out and we found it to be fun!! So, consider joining us for fun and games and delicious goodies on Sunday, October 17th. Reservations are necessary. ## The master bedroom ceiling is blooming!!!!

Thomas Melvin, the same Chicago artist who has painted the Millikin Homestead’s dining room - and parlor ceilings in the mid 1990s, is at work again. Based on a black and white photograph showing some ceiling details and through color “sleuthing” (analysis) the floral ceiling in the master bedroom is being replicated.



The work is progressing nicely; we include a photo from a visit to his studio where the huge canvas pieces are attached to the walls, and roses in soft yellow and pink hues are starting to “bloom.” It is possible that the ceiling might be finished by mid October! We are very excited and very anxious for all of you to see this newest restoration project.

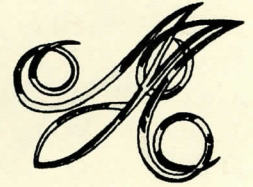
