LEAVE A LEGACY DECATUR, ILLINOIS

"DO MORE THAN JUST MAKE Α WILL. DO SOMETHING GREAT."

The Board of the Millikin Homestead announced in a previous newsletter that it is participating in the Decatur Leave A Legacy program.

Leave A Legacy is a nationwide organization whose mission is to increase charitable bequests to local non-profit organizations. It was created to inspire people of all ages and all walks of life to consider how they might leave a lasting legacy by making a charitable bequest to local non-profit groups they support.

What does it mean to Leave A Legacy? It means leaving a gift from your estate to a charitable organization of your You may have heard this described as planned or deferred giving. Planned gifts come in all sizes. bequest in your will - whether it's \$100 or \$1 million - would be appreciated by any non-profit organization.

How do I leave a gift! It is easy. You can arrange for a gift in several ways. The most common way is through a will or a living trust. Many people set aside a certain dollar amount. Others leave a percentage of their estate or any assets left over after providing for their family. Still others leave a paid-up life insurance policy, retirement account or other financial investment.

Do I have to completely revise my will to Leave A Legacy? No. Simply ask your attorney to amend your will or trust to include a bequest to a charity or charities, and 1) designate the charity or charities to receive the gift, and 2) designate the amount of your bequest or leave a percentage of your estate to the organization.

The Board of the Millikin Homestead sincerely hopes that the Millikin Homestead will be a charity of your choice, and that you will include the Homestead in your estate plans.

A Personal Legacy From The Millikins

"Hello, third-graders, I am Mr." Millikin and I am very rich," I tell four different classrooms of children visiting the north parlor of the James Millikin Homestead.

"This is a painted portrait of my lovely wife, Anna Aston Millikin, and I want to tell you she is very strict. I was afraid she wouldn't allow you in the house because it rained this morning."

"If it rained while we were entertaining Millikin students on the lawn, she made them go back to the Millikin University campus," I told the children. "She didn't want them tracking her floors, so be very careful when you see Mrs. Millikin (Joan Nixon) in the dining room."

The third-graders' eyes got as large as the giant cookies given them by the dining room maid, Ann Seidman. They became so quiet you could hear yarn against yarn of the knitting being done two rooms away.

After my talk with thirdgraders, the first-floor maid, Jeanette Bradley, opened the mansion's pocket doors and took the children to the south parlor to hear Barbara Keagle play an antique organ and join her in a sing-along. The upstairs maid, Sally Krigbaum, gave second-floor tours.

Each class left through the back door after Brigitta Kapp, the kitchen maid, showed them how to wash clothes using a washboard and tub.

As I left, thinking about how important this visit was for Decatur children, Bill McGaughey a volunteer gardener at the Homestead, was giving a tour of the carriage house, grounds and gardens that he keeps impeccably

I straightened up, clasped my hands behind my back, attempting to a very pensive appear to be philanthropist, and wondered what my legacy would be to a city I loved.

There Are Sleuths Among Us

. . and they have discovered wonderful things - a scrapbook that involves the Millikins and a burial site that doesn't!!

Jason Butterick, Historian and Associate at Millikin Archivist University, has uncovered a little known scrapbook that James Millikin kept while living in Danville in his drover days. James, being notably careful with a nickel, used a discarded 1853 register from his hotel, the McCormack House, as the base for his collection of pasted-in-newspaper clippings, among them a September 5, 1854 obituary of his sister, Nancy Vandyke Millikin, as well as excerpts from the 1849 Democratic Party platform and in an unbiased manner, its 1856 Republican counterpart. Other political literature was included indicating his great interest in current affairs.

When Iason spoke at the Homestead's Annual Meeting in April, he outlined his search from the time he happened on a passage in Albert Taylor's Life Story of James Millikin mentioning the scrapbook. Its trail was then traced back from its original use to its new life as a personal record of news items important to lames, eventually including the announcement of his engagement to Anna Aston. Until about 1860 he continued to add clippings from area papers, having brought the book with him when he settled in Decatur with his new bride. It's assumed that business interests and community activities consumed his time and the book no longer played a part in his life, probably being consigned to the attic until, after Anna's death in 1913 it somehow came

into Aibert Taylor's possession. After citing it in his biography of Millikin, Mr. Taylor took the book back to Danville, where it originated and presented it to the D.A.R. collection at the Danville Public Library in 1926. Following a long and cold trail, Jason Butterick finally located it in the Vermillion County Museum. Thanks to Jason and the kind staff at the Museum, one can actually see the old book - enjoying not only Mr. Millikin's clipping but various hotel guests' signatures (including Benjamin Harrison's!!) still recognizable. A copy may become available to the Homestead but if you are in Danville, the REAL THING is right there in a case. As an added treasure, Jason has donated a copy of his talk delineating the full story of Mr. Millikin's Scrapbook for our files.

Our other sleuth?! Susan Siefferman, our caretaker, used her computer skills to research the true story of John Q. Adams whose tombstone was found recently near Latham. Though this find did not relate directly to the

Homestead, it points out the many ways in which we discover new things about our history. Thanks to both our local Sherlocks!!
