NOOKS AND CRANNIES

ound in many old houses are hidden niches and crevices, doors and drawers in unexpected spots and snuggeries for curling up for a good read – in my mind these are nooks and crannies and the Homestead has several.

In the squared bay in the north parlor (a nook in itself) are two niches, ideal for displaying treasures. In Mr. and Mrs. Millikin's day large vases (no longer with us) held forth there. The south parlor has its own bay – large, light and oval, a perfect spot in this more informal room for a pair of chairs, a cup of tea and a chat.

In Mr. Millikin's adjoining study is the wonderful large closet with shelves and doors and drawers, just the spot for household records, office supplies - all those miscellaneous accumulations needed but best kept out of sight.

The "new" bathroom off the library has a wealth of "crannies" vari-sized doors set into the walls (carpenters sometimes called them "stud cabinets" tucked in, then shelved and doored to provide storage space for sundry items). It could be imagined that each panel conceals a hidden treasure (or at least a wall safe - but remember Mr. Millikin had his own bank - a big one downtown).

One of the questions volunteer tour guides often get is: "Are there secret passages?? To our knowledge "no" but wouldn't it be great if there were. The short door on the east wall of the history room often leads to such a query but alas it conceals only the long sliding rack under the stair where folding chairs are stored. How prosaic!! Wouldn't it be great if there were a hidden room under the stair landing?? I wonder...

Even the working kitchen has interesting tucka-ways: the deep window sills on the north side must have held plants, or in season a cooling rhubarb pie, said to be James Millikin's favorite.

Back in the main hall a cutaway corner at the foot of the grand stairway guards the lady with the lamp, perfect for that showcase and the imposing fireplace opposite the stair has lovely small arched



areas for the odd object: a dried posy, small pictures or other bibelots appropriate to the era.

At the head of the stairs in the Art Class Room, at floor level on either side of the fireplace are two small drawers - hiding places for the most secret items. Though we sometimes call them glove drawers it's difficult to imagine a Victorian lady clad in the heavily staved garments of the day flexible enough to bend all the way to the floor to fetch her gloves.

Of course, best of all is the mansard roofed cupola, high on top of the house, above the problems of the world, needing only a comfy cushion and a good book to become the greatest cranny of all!!
