As a League we have joined the Macon County Child Welfare Association which is presently working to establish a new juvenile detention facility for Macon County. The conditions of detention in the present facility (3 small cells isolated in the County Building) are deplorable. Our job is mainly education of the public as to the needs at this time.

In addition, the self-fulfillment of each child must be a major concern. Such approaches as team-teaching and independent study should be considered. As for the specific grade organization, the middle school should include at least three grades, preferably 6 through 8th, or fifth through eighth.
