
Oriel 2000 - Splendor in Glass



elotte-Morse-Leonatti, the firm working on the first of our three oriel window panels, invited the Homestead board to visit its workshop in Springfield to observe the project's progress. We were impressed with their thorough and meticulous approach. Approximately 2000 pieces of glass have been cataloged and numbered. A rubbing of the overall design and an exact drawing have been made. Much of the brown glass used around the perimeter of the window had cracked and crumbled over the years. This is most likely the result of that particular batch cooling down too rapidly in the production process. New compatible hand made glass has been located at a Chicago firm and will be used where needed. The original glass and leading will be left in place wherever possible.

We hope to have the panel reinstalled in May or June. Mr. Ralls Melotte will speak at our annual meeting and provide interesting details about the project and gladly answer any questions you have about restoring leaded glass in general. Come to the annual meeting and learn more!!!

Grounds

Looking forward to spring, we will see some 200 bulbs blooming, small and large, enhancing the garden area. Perennials have been planted this past fall with hopes of an early start in May. Additional perennials are on order for March and April planting, as well. Annual will be mixed in for fall color.

We received compliments on the garden color this past year. I will work to improve planting to in some way represent the color and texture as the famed Victorian gardener, Gertrude Jackyl, would wish. (How's that for name dropping!)

Millikin's Grounds Department mention how nice red geraniums would look in the front edge of the flag pole plantings. "Great idea," said I, "you give them, I'll plant them." Result, 105 red geraniums looked great. I hope for the same this year.

We regret the loss of the 100 year plus aged Norway Spruce that guarded the north side of the Carriage House for these many years. Seems that it was just too attractive to the big bolt of lightning and Millikin was kind enough to remove it, sparing us the sight of it's slow death.

We plan to plant two young white pines this early spring. One to go northwest of the reconstructed oriel window to give protection from late summer sun which was believed to be partially responsible for the damage over the years. The other white pine will go in an area approximating aforementioned removed spruce. Last fall a young Washington Hawthorn was transplanted from the tree nursery to a spot in the southwest lawn. It should show nice color in a year or two. A stately young pin oak now in the nursery is waiting for a place on the lawn. Your suggestions as to its placement will be appreciated.

Millikin's lawn care is appreciated as before and their snow removal has been outstanding. We hope their efforts for controlling late summer weeds and dandelions will be successful.

PACA Packed the Door!


he Millikin Homestead thanks PACA for providing a period replacement for our deteriorated back door at the kitchen entrance!

PACA is the Preservation and Conservation Association of Champaign County. This not-for-profit organization was formed in 1981 to help protect and preserve the architectural heritage of that area.

PACA continually works to renovate buildings and to save others from demolition. If demolition is "unstoppable," PACA tries to save all worthwhile architectural details and offer the salvaged parts to the general public at a very modest price. Any income is used to offset the cost of operating their large salvage warehouse and to promote awareness of historic preservation. The whole operation is staffed by dedicated volunteers.

Since the Homestead is also a not-for-profit volunteer organization dedicated to historic preservation, PACA gave us the door at no charge. We thank them most sincerely!
