Confusion about these meetings have resulted because several times in recent years the city has sponsored all day Saturday community meetings on various local topics of interest and called them Town Meetings. There's no connection between them!

Policies, Procedures and Services. Our Board has been asked for suggestions for changes in basic League policies, and for improvements in procedures and services of the State and National Boards.

Local Program. See below.

Suggested items (new and old) requiring new study next year.

- 1. Civil Rights! Study and evaluation of the need for funds by the Decatur Human Relations Commission. (This would involve an evaluation of the work of the Commission in all human relations areas, would require comparison with other Commissions in Illinois and elsewhere, and would require consensus-taking on the question of the need for funds.)
- 2. Equal Housing: Evaluation of the fair housing ordinance in Decatur. (Should it be stronger, is it effective, should it be rescinded, how does it compare with other cities in Illinois, etc.?)
- Human Resources: Study and evaluation of programs in Decatur and Macon County which provide for all persons equality of opportunity in education and employment. (Scope: Survey and evaluate all programs affecting squality of opportunity for education and employment in Decatur and Macon County, with attention given to such things as equal opportunity for membership in unions and apprentice programs.)

--Continued study of needs and operation of the library.

(Scope: The committee foresees considerable interest and action within the community during the next year. Therefore the League will be more active publicly.)

5. Decatur Public Schools:
-Support of measures to provide adequate space and quality education program.
-Study of ways to improve public education in Decatur.

6. Decatur Public Schools:
--Support of increased funds to provide quality education and adequate space.

--Study of ways to improve public education in Decatur.
--Study of the procedures and practices regulating Board of Education

election.
(Scope: Surely there will be a proposed tax rate increase sometime this year and this committee would head League's work for the increase. The third part of the item would be an evaluation of the terms of office, the time of the election, how often it is held, etc., and could lead to consensus and action.)

7. Juvenile Detention Facilities: Study of the need in Decatur and Macon County for a detention facility for dependent and neglected or delinquent children. (Scope: Would require interviews with officials in the Department of

present laws. (Aupe: Survey + evaluate present duties and estimates of various officials, commissions and committees.)

Department of Family Services, County Board of Supervisors, police and sheriff's offices, Judge Morthland. Possibly the group would visit Perria or Quincy, where stuch centers are now located, and would need to get information about other such facilities in Illinois and elsewhere. It was estimated that a hard-working committee could complete the work in two or three months.)

The chairmen suggested dropping the following items:

- 8. Governmental Planning: Study of governmental planning agencies in Decatur and Macon County. (This item was a survey-of-government type and will be completed this year.)
- Macon County Nursing Home: Continued evaluation of the need for a Macon County Nursing Home.
- 10. Macon County Health Department: Support of efficient development and operation of the Macon County Health Department. (This study was completed in 1962 and would probably have to be done extensively if we were to act in this area.)
- 11. Water Resources: Support of sound development of Decatur's water resources. (We can take some action under this item under the national consensus.)

The chairman suggested we retain the following item but did not foresee a great deal of action.

12. Council-Manager Form of City Government: Support of Council-Manager form of government for the city of Decatur.
