National preservationist visits Homestead, gives lookover

Bob Yapp of Hannibal, Mo., a nationally recognized preservationist who hosted PBS-TV's "Around the House with Bob Yapp" for 10 years, did a professional lookover of the Homestead in June.

Calling the Homestead a "treasure for Decatur and the entire nation," Yapp made several observations regarding the historic preservation work that needs done to the 1876 landmark. As a result of Yapp's visit, the Homestead Board requested a cost estimate from him for a complete study to determine the scope and cost of the historic preservation work that needs done.

Bob's daylong visit, at the request of new Board member Doug Warren, had been sparked in part by Board concerns about needed restorations to the Homestead's distinctive turret.

Yapp has proposed to do a complete study from basement to roof outlining

itemized and prioritized needs, supplying pre-written Request for Proposals (RFP) for contractors who qualify to do historic preservation work. The RFPs are to include detailed needs, quality of workmanship, quality of materials, time lines and complete details, Yapp says.

The Board is currently raising donations to help fund this important study assessment and the restoration work to follow. Recently, a group of teenagers with wide eyes toured the Homestead, with one saying, "This place is cool." The Board is committed to having future generations in a hundred years saying the same. 
last couple of seasons. And her beautiful watercolor painting of the Homestead has become our trademark. We thank Pam and wish her the best as she takes some time for herself.


