> imagined what it must have been like to live in a beautiful mansion in the late 1800s. On April 21st through the 24th, the James Millikin Homestead volunteers once again dressed in period attire to transport eager children back to the days when James and Anna Millikin lived in their busy home.

The children's eyes were wide as they stepped inside to meet Mr. Millikin. Although, he had to quickly tell them Mrs. Millikin wasn't happy with him today, because he forgot to tell her the children were coming. Once Mr. Millikin told them his story about how he came to Decatur from Pennsylvania, the children were off to visit with "Mr. Bellows" (Rick Strine), who was waiting for them in the south Parlor. On other days it was Mrs. Millikin's musical friend (Barb Keagle and Millie Gonzalez).

The children sang songs from the antique pump organ and a few of them were given the privilege to pump the pedals as the organist played the keys to the tune of "Skip to my Lue my Darling." Next was the library, where the children were shown Mr. Millikin's original desk where he worked a few hours in the evening after coming home from a day at the bank.




As the festivities progressed, there was no resisting our sweet cravings of homemade and not so homemade chocolates brought in by the Board
