

Ehrlich, Paul Population Bomb (301.32/E/1971) In the revised edition of one of the first books on the subject, Dr. Ehrlich clearly describes why everyone, from federal government to city planners to every day people, needs to be aware and take into account the population growth.

Ehrlich, Paul R. The Population Explosion (304.6/E) "From global warming to rain forest destruction, famine, and air and water pollution - why overpopulation is our #1 environmental problem." Among other facts, explains why overpopulation in the USA is more serious than rapid population growth in poor countries.

Fraser, Dean The People Problem: What You Should Know About Growing Population and Vanishing Resources (301.32/F) Though written over 20 years ago, this book still provides a good background about population concerns and what needs to be done to control the world growth.

Answers the question as to what
works in population control by
discussing the population
programs that were funded by
the USA and other countries
between 1974 and 1984 when
several billion dollars were
spent to combat the population
growth in different parts of
the developing world.

Harrison, Paul The Third Revolution: Environment.

Population and a Sustainable Morld (304.2/H) "Shows how population growth, rising consumption and damaging technologies combined to trigger the biggest environmental crisis in human history."

Meadows, Donella, Dennis Meadows and Jorgen Randers.

Beyond the Limits: Confronting Global Collapse, Envisioning a Sustainable Future (363.91/M)
Sequel to The Limits to Growth, the authors show that the world has already overshot some of its limits, and provides help in confronting the possibility of global collapse.

Meadows, Donella H. The Global Citizen (304.2/M) Newspaper columnist and former professor of environmental studies, Meadows discusses a wide range of factors that relate to the environment and population, from poverty and development, to healthy farming to garbage to energy to planetary systems.

Piel, Gerard Only One World:

Our Own to Make and to Keep

(304.2/P) Discusses how economic development and the acceleration of the industrial revolution in the poor countries are necessary to stabilize world population.

Tapinos, Georges and Phyllis T.
Piotrow. Six Billion People:

good background on the World
demographic indicators and
growth rates in South Asia,
Latin American, Africa and
China. Critically evaluates
