Decatur Diary

Grocery Opened 112 Years Ago Downtown

It's been a long time since the neighborhood grocery store took the major share of the share of the housewife's food dollar.

By far, most food sales are rung up on the cash registers of large supermarkets and chain stores

It's not that there are any fewer of the smaller "corner stores," but rather, housewives, for the most part, prefer supermarket showners


There are now some 60 neighborhood stores in Decatur while there were about 25 in the 1890s. With the outward growth of the city, more smaller stores have been added—and so also have the supermarkets.

When the city was small, there was a heavy concentration of corner groceries in what is now the downtown area. In the one block length of Merchant Street alone, there were five groceries at one time.

At various times, these groceries have operated on Merchant Street: H. Lyon at 154, Logan & Beik at 150, D. H. Heilman at 108, Cash Market at 122, Barbey at 130 and the Pood

Undoubtedly the oldest surviving food market in the city is the grocery that is now known as Howard's at 102 S. Water St.

John Imboden, founder of the first meat market on the site, came to Decatur in 1855 and purchased the then vacant lot at S. Main and Wood streets 10

lays after his arrival. He ouilt the first structure on the lot shortly afterwards.

Cyrus Imboden, son of the original owner, went into the meat market business there in 1865, and 'later on with his brother, John G. Imboden in the business, it was known as the Imboden Bros. Market

The store continued with the Imbodens until 1996, when it was taken over by E. A. Nichols who kept up the meat market tradition until he moved out in 1999.

Subsequent Owners

There were several owners in

the 30s. They were O. V. Vest, Jacob Morgenstern, Chan Bayless, O. N. Freischlag and Clarence Haines.

In 1940, Howard E. Bardsley purchased the store from Haines and since his death in 1960, the store has been run by his widow.

Shortly after Bardsley purchased the building, he combined the building next door at 156 8. Main St. which he had owned with the front of 162 S. Main St.

Bardsley had also operated food stores at 2600 W. Main St. and 1136 E. Eldorado St.

One of the tenants in the

building was Frank Plumer who was considered the dean of Decatur's grocerymen when he died in 1934. Plumer lived to be 89 years old and operated out of the 162 S. Main St. store around 1910.

Like most of his fellow groceryman at the time, Plumer operated a grocery delivery service. Very few markets offer such service today.

Plumer's store did not have grocery carts. Customers did not buy much at any one time because they could not stock up. Foods were more perishable then.

Nearly as old is the building next door at 135-139 E. Main St. It was built by William Powers in 1856.

The building was owned for a time by Henry Bachrach. He sold it in 1913 for \$50,000. Mut ual Home and Saving Association bought the site in 1920 where the firm has been located ever since.

Restaurant Since 1899

Harvey Greider opened a restaurant on the corner of Main and Water streets in 1899 and the restaurant business has been there ever since, now know as the Wooden Shoe

The building was constructed about 1855 and has been remodeled and enlarged several times during its long history



Buildings on the right side of street-still standing-are suggested civic center site.

The old Wooden Shoe which had been located at 241 E. Main St. merged with Greider's Cafe in 1962.

Ownership of the building passed from the William Powers estate in 1883 to Mrs. Sarah Ewing for \$23,500. It subsequently passed from the W. T. Wells estate in 1912 to Mrs. D. Shockley, then to Henry Bachrach in 1912 for \$30,000.

Harvey Greider owned the building from 1934 until h i s death in 1942. It has been under the ownership of his widow until her death in January of this year.

Another old-timer is the building at 117 E. Main St., where Enloe's Drug Store is now located The building was built in 1861, after an old frame building which had housed one of Decatur's early post offices and a general store had been located.

The present site has been the location of a drug store for 122 years. The site was known as Dr. Robert's Drugstore form 1845 until 1870, occupying both the old frame building and the present building.

Clint Armstrong operated a drug store at the site from 187 until 1892. The operation was taken over by E. A. West in that year and he was succeeded by Roy Enloe in 1939.

Decatur's oldest existing ho tel was built in 1860 on the northwest corner of Water and Wood streets. It has undergone

many name-changes and chang es of ownership in its 107-year history.

It was constructed by Charle M. Reddick and first named in Pennsylvania Hotel. It was also know as the American are Brunswick before it was a the Decatur Hotel in 1947.

Oldest Grocery Store

Decatur's oldest grocery storand still in operation is lecated on the corner of Mai and Wood streets. The buildin was built in 1855 by John In boden and be and his sons ra a meat market there until 1996.

The grocery store is now Howard's Supermarket. It was purchased by Howard Bardsle in 1940 and is currently run by Mrs. Randelow


Mr. Bartisley was the owner of Howard's Royal Blue Super Market at the corner of Wood and Main streets and entered the retall grocery business in Decatur

From 1862 to 1944 he owned the Food Arcade at 138 Merchant St., and also owned a grocery store at 1136 E. Eldorado St.

In 1951 he bought a fruit and grocery market at 851 N. Water

He is the former president of the Central Illinois Food Dealers and Illinois State Food Distribu-

He was born March 6, 1904 in Collinsville, the son of Martin N. and Alice Jane Howard Bardsley. Mr. Bardsley moved here from Hillsborn in 1904 and enfered the
