



Situated just east of College Square, the residence has been known by many names in its long life.

It was once the home of L. L. Haworth, Decatur mayor in 1879. He and his sons ran an early farm implement manufacturing firm which developed and manufactured a check row planting device for planting corn.



This home has a steep pitched roof and long narrow windows which demonstrate some Gothic in-
