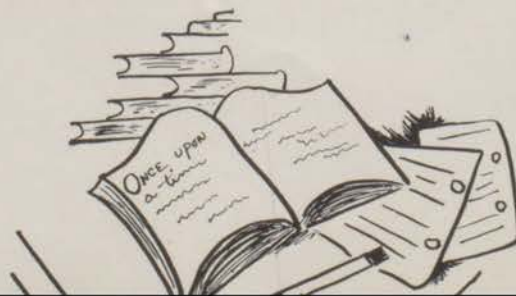

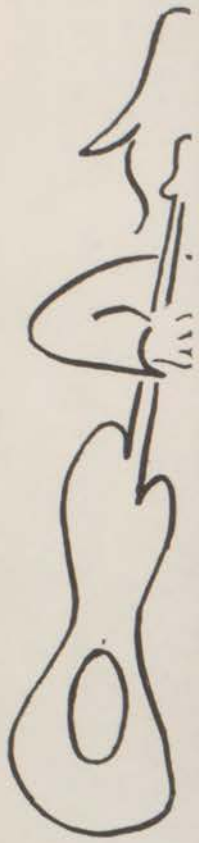

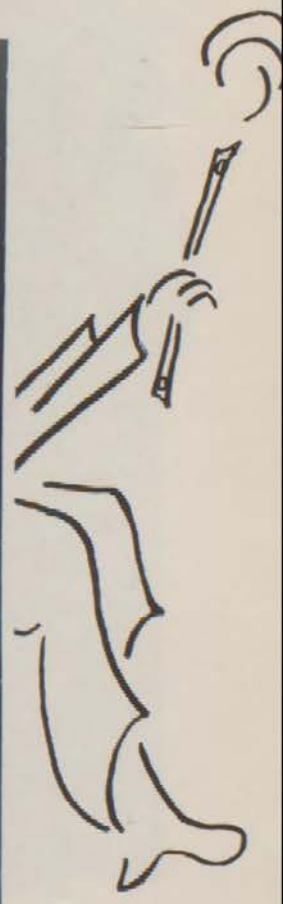

She helps chaperone many school activities, and takes a sincere interest in all the students at Eisenhower High School.

DEAN OF BOYS

GUIDANCE

Guidance is made up of a variety of services which have the common objective of helping students become increasingly self-guided toward maximum utilization of their talents and opportunities.

At Eisenhower, each student is assigned to a counselor during the Freshman year and continues with the same counselor during his attendance here. This encourages the development of a close personal relationship during the four years.

Individual counseling, the primary service offered by the department, is a relationship in which the counselor assists the student to understand himself and to make meaningful adjustments as a result of this understanding. The administration and interpretation of special tests of aptitude, achievement, and interest is vital to this understanding.

Other services to students provide information concerning vocational choice and preparation, training schools and colleges, financial aids and employment, and armed service opportunities.

The Guidance department also works with the student's parents by showing them in what fields the student has special ability. With this knowledge the parents can talk to their son or daughter with greater confidence than before. In turn, the student can also talk with his parents more freely now that they have been told by someone else of his interests and abilities.

Eisenhower's English Department has been chosen as a part of a study of high school English programs. The study which consists of 110 high schools across the country was conducted by the University of Illinois and was sponsored by the National Council of Teachers of English.

Since English is required for all students, classes are devised to meet the needs of all the students. A four-year accelerated honor program has been set up for those students showing special talent in English. Individual classes help those who have difficulty. Also under the English department are the speech and drama classes.

In all English classes, students strive to become more effective in expressing themselves, more proficient in their writing, and more reflective in their thinking because of their reading and understanding of great literature.

The main responsibility of the Business Education Department of Eisenhower is to prepare students for employment in the business world.

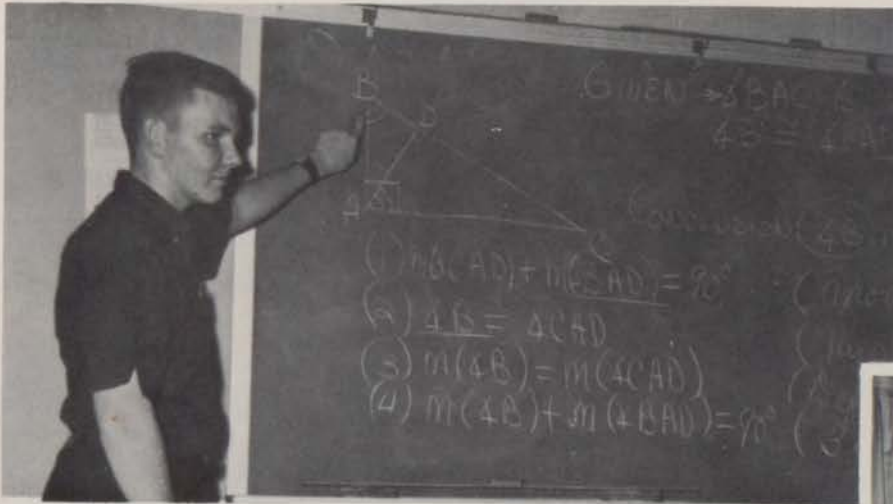

These areas are: Drafting, Metalwork, Power and Transportation, Electronics, and Cabinetmaking. Other areas offered on the vocational level include Graphic Arts, Building Trades, Machine Shop, Auto Mechanics, and three areas of on-the-job training-Diversified Occupations, Office Occupations, and Distributive Education.

The Industrial Education program is very important to everyone as a possible vocational interest to pursue in preparation for entry into the labor force after graduation from high school. Some of these courses must be taken, especially if the student is planning to go into engineering.

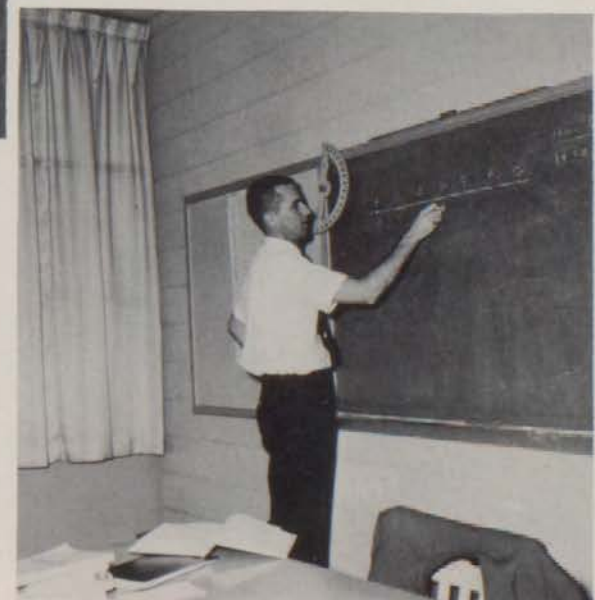

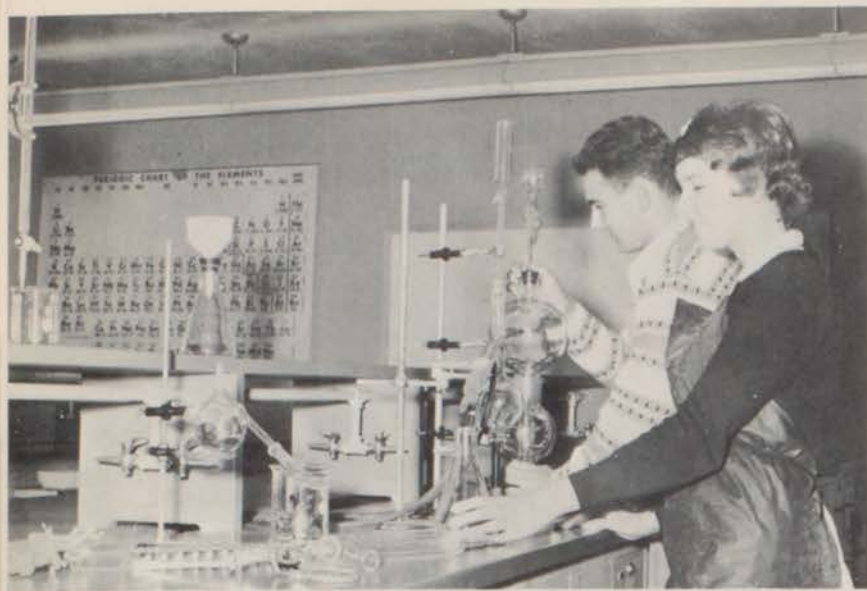


Gary Secor points out the steps in the proof of his geometry problem.

The Mathematics department at Eisenhower attempts to offer the courses which will best benefit each student. For those who are unskilled in mathematics, General Mathematics I and II are offered. General Mathematics 1, 2, 3, and 4 are offered for those who are not college bound. Those who are college bound may choose between two four-year programs: the traditional program and the University of Illinois Committee on School Mathematics (called the U.I.C.S.M.) The traditional program puts more emphasis on manipulation while the U.I.C.S.M. enables the student to get a much more enriched program. However, in all Eisenhower mathematics classes, the overall objective is to teach the student to think logically.

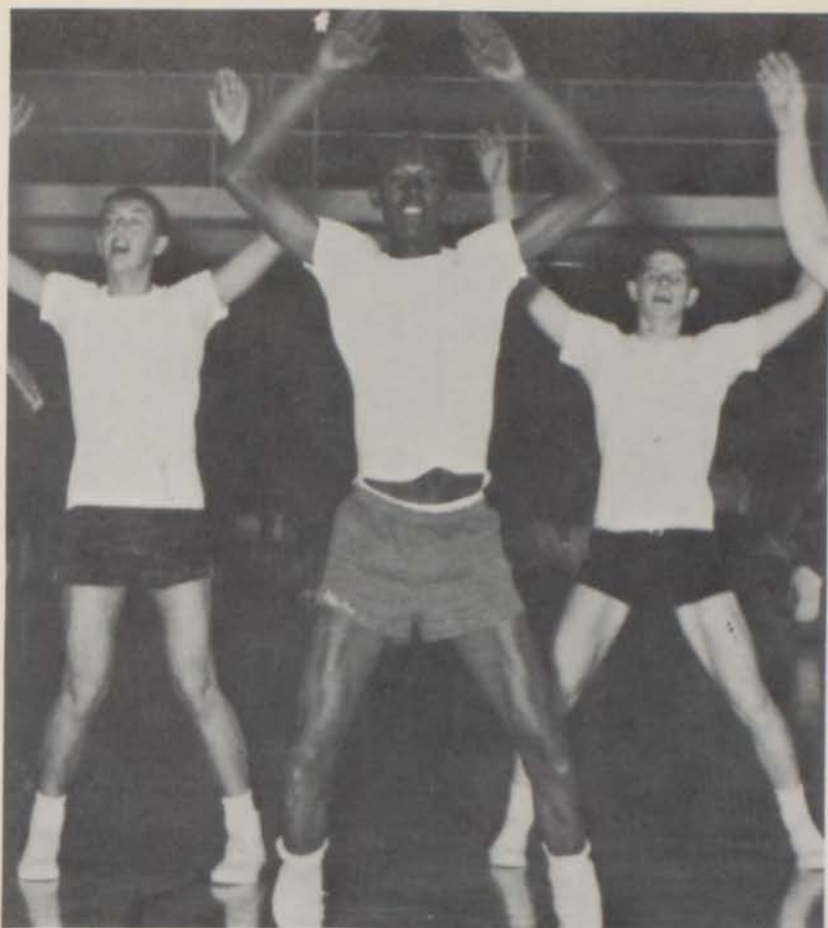
The Social Science Department gives students background in geography, world history, American history, Social Problems, and Government Problems. Each year Eisenhower submits entries to the Voice of Democracy Contest, and sends delegates to the American Red Cross Convention.

Each student at Eisenhower is required to take three years of social science with the optional Social Problems and Government Problems during his Senior year.

Students learn such things as the names of important government officials, national and international problems, history of the United States and the whole world, and the principles of our present-day democracy.

The Boys' Physical Education Department puts a lot of emphasis on keeping the boys at Eisenhower physically fit. Approximately one-half of the entire gym period is devoted to exercises while the rest of the period is occupied with the playing of some sport. Some of the sports which are played here include football, basketball, baseball, track, volleyball, and wrestling. The boys are taught good sportsmanship as well as the correct procedures on how to play a certain game.

Also, part of the Physical Education program is devoted to the study of health. In these classes, which meet one week in every six weeks, the boys are taught about mental and physical health, along with good health habits.

Physical Education Promotes Fitness, Co-ordination, Fun.

The activities which take place in the Girls' Physical Education classes are many and varied. Some sports which are played by the girls include basketball, volleyball, badminton, and table tennis. The P.E. class usually begins with exercises, which are modified boys' exercises. The rest of the period is spent playing some sport, doing some tumbling routines, or perhaps learning a new dance.

The girls' P.E. classes, like the boys', spend one week every six weeks in health class. Here the girls are taught the fundamentals of physical health and good grooming. They also learn about mental health and the problems it confronts our modern world.

Club Builds Eifel Tower

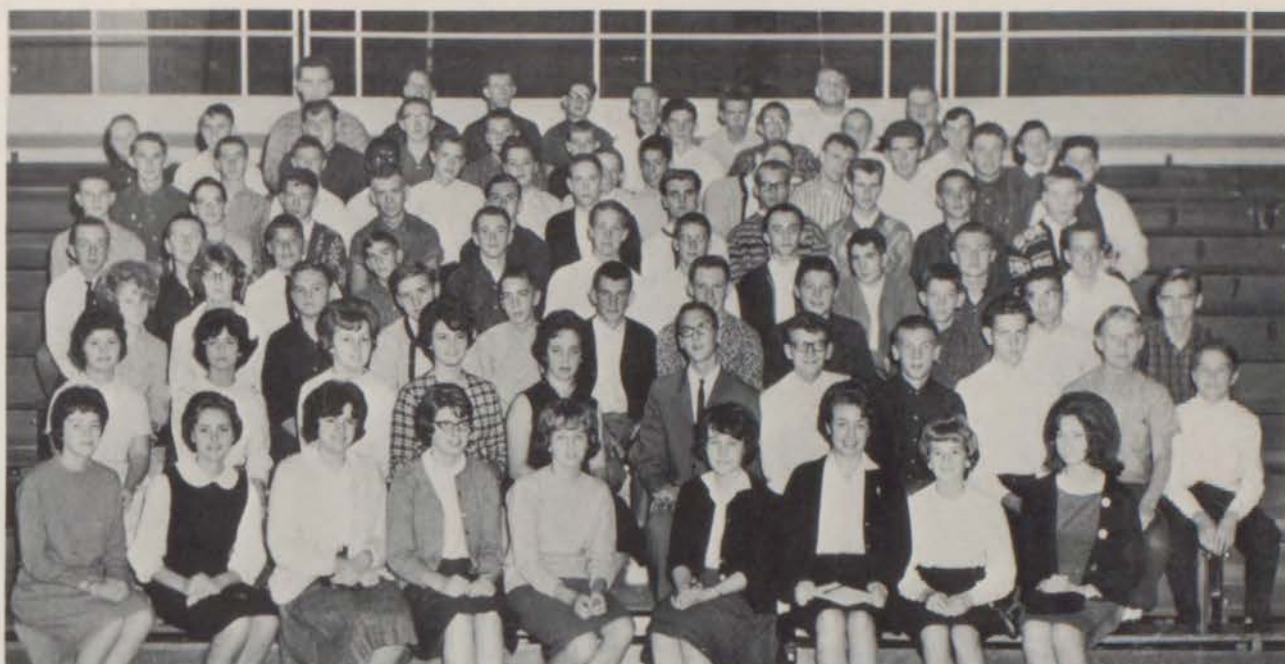

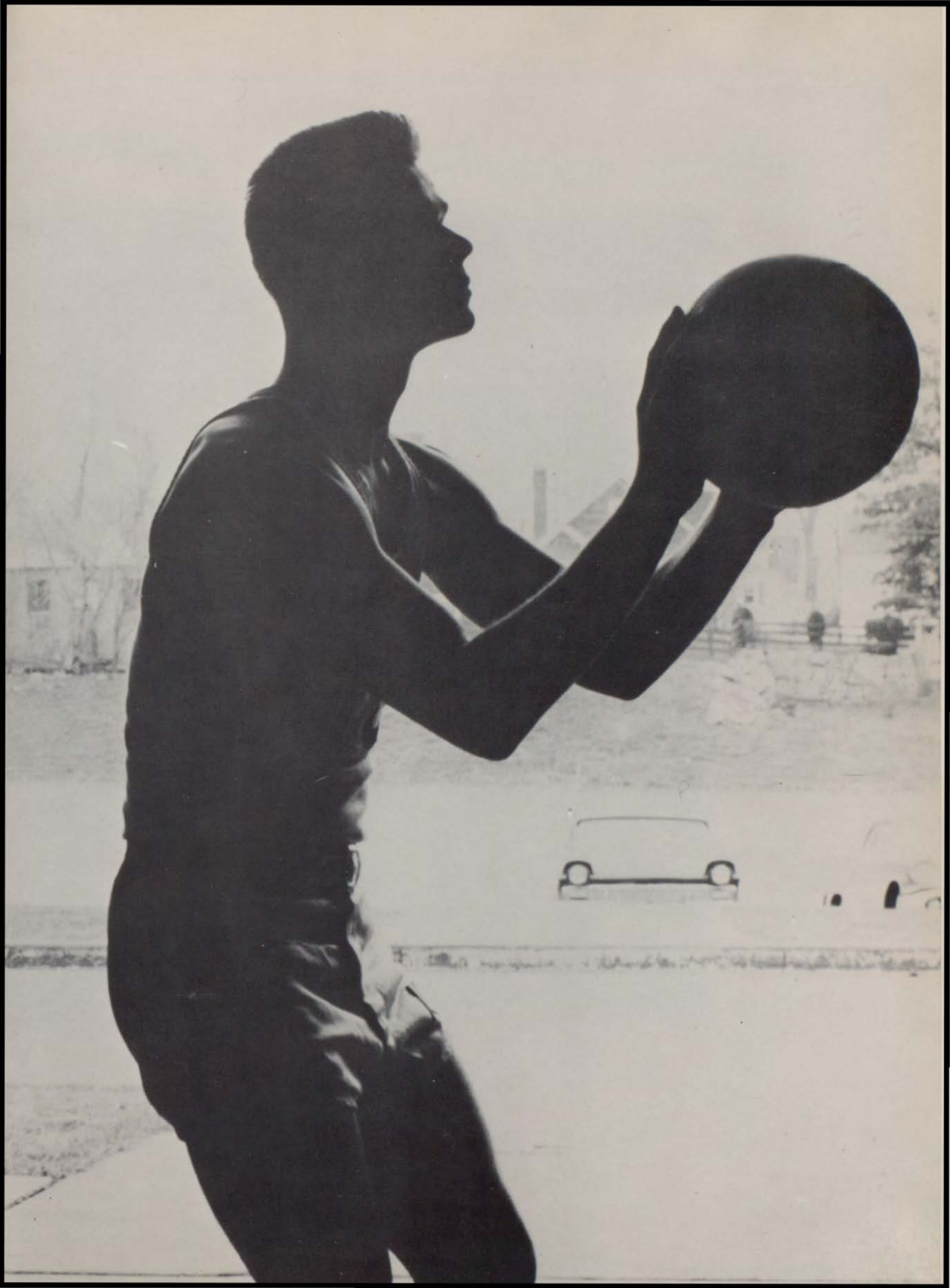
NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

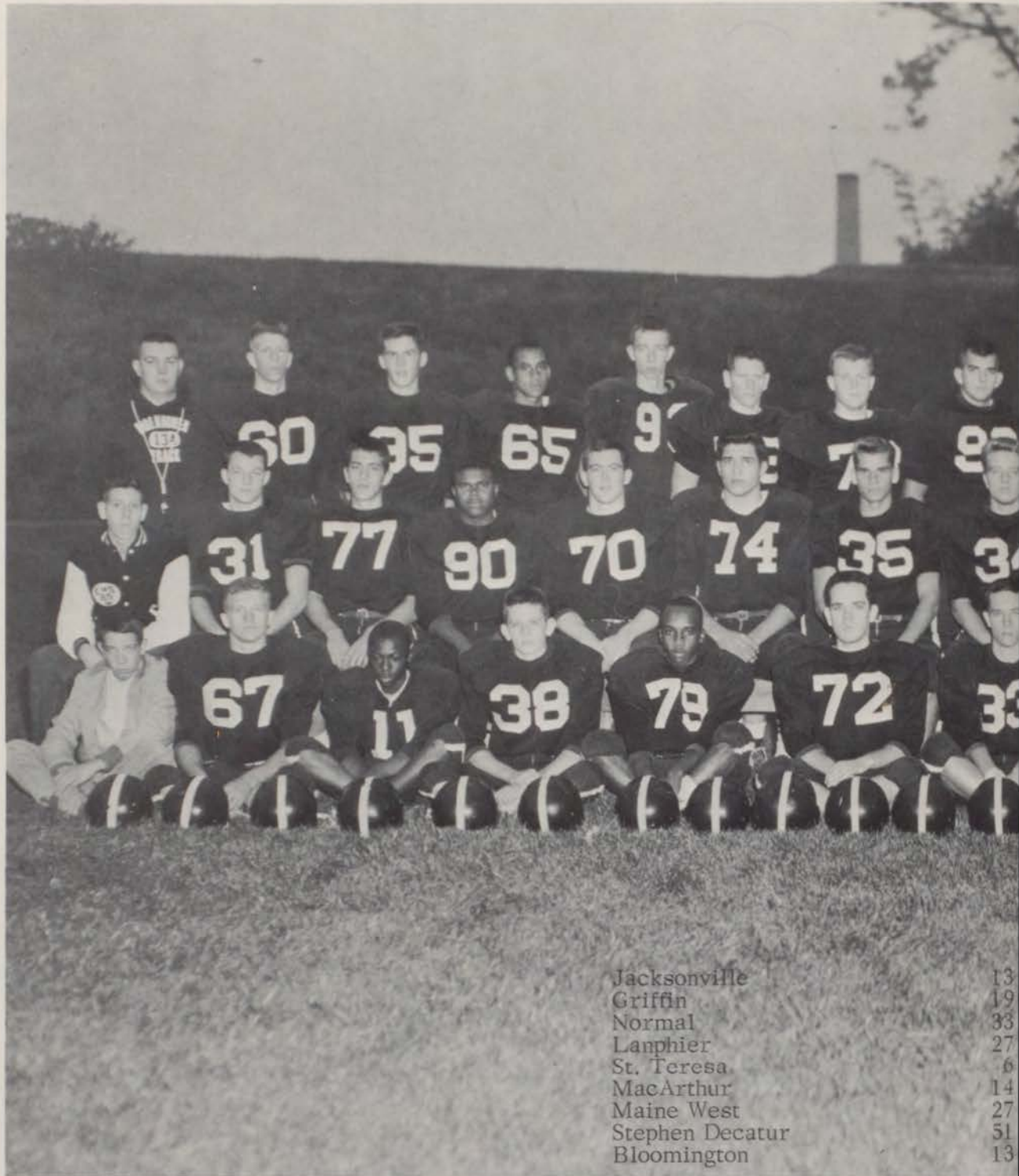

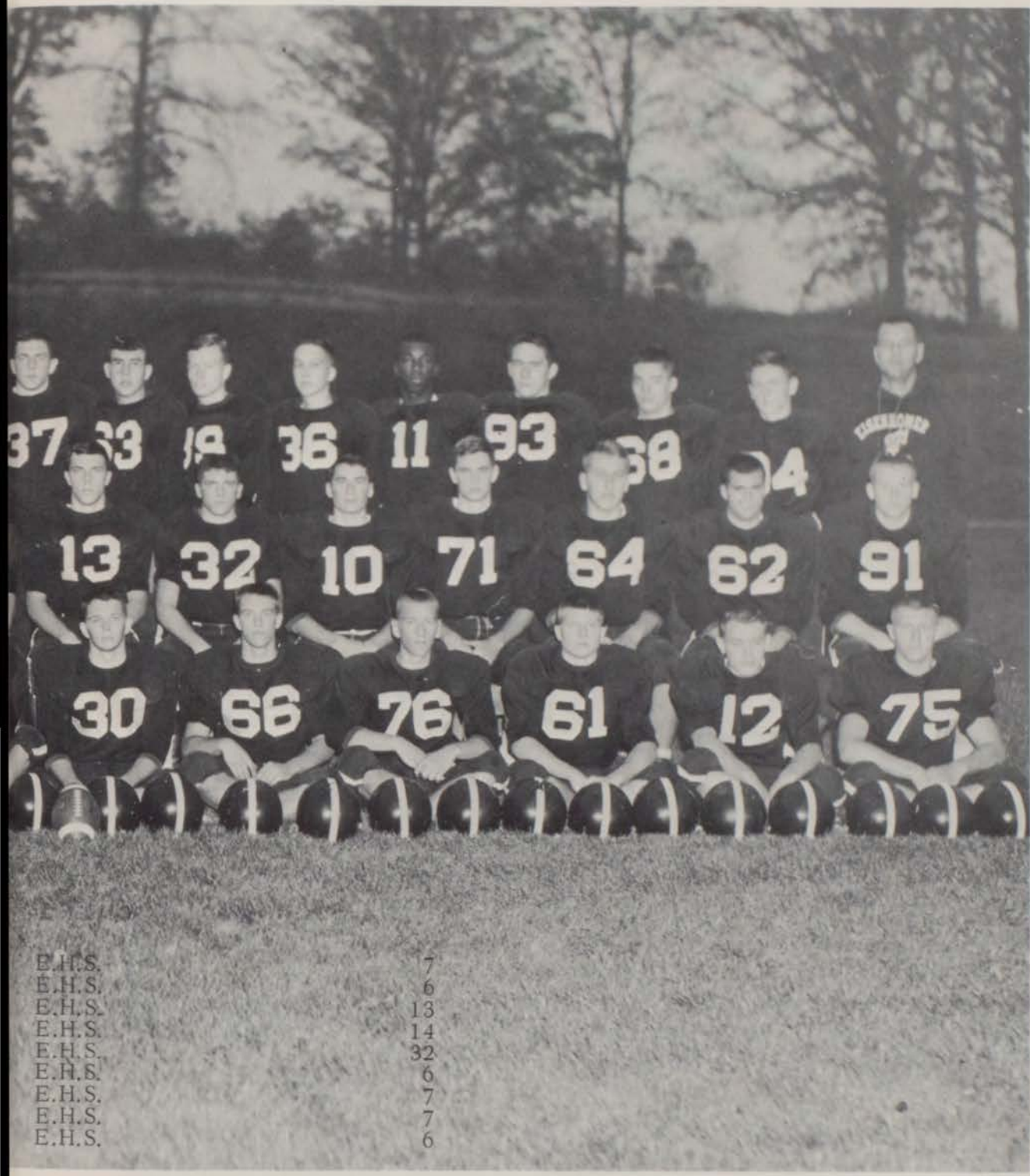

Football - 1963

Homecoming annually stands for celebration, and for the 1963 Panther football team it marked the one such celebration of an otherwise winless campaign. Three September losses were capped with a resounding loss to powerful Stephen Decatur. From this point on improvement was steady, but not enough to register victories. Following the 32-7 Homecoming win over St. Teresa, the Panthers dropped well-played games to powerful Maine West and to unbeaten Bloomington. Despite losing, the 2-day venture into Chicagoland undoubtedly provided the high spot of the year. A defeat at Spring-

field Lanphier set the stage for the annual MacArthur game---a close one---but won by the Generals 14-6. This marked the first time that a city opponent had gained a serious edge over Eisenhower.

Jerry Scherer swept past season honors by being named Most Valuable Player, Most Valuable Lineman, and gaining a berth on the All-City team.

Lee Boyko was the Optimist Club award winner as well as an All-City selection.

Jim Zimmer and Don Briggs also were All-City choices.

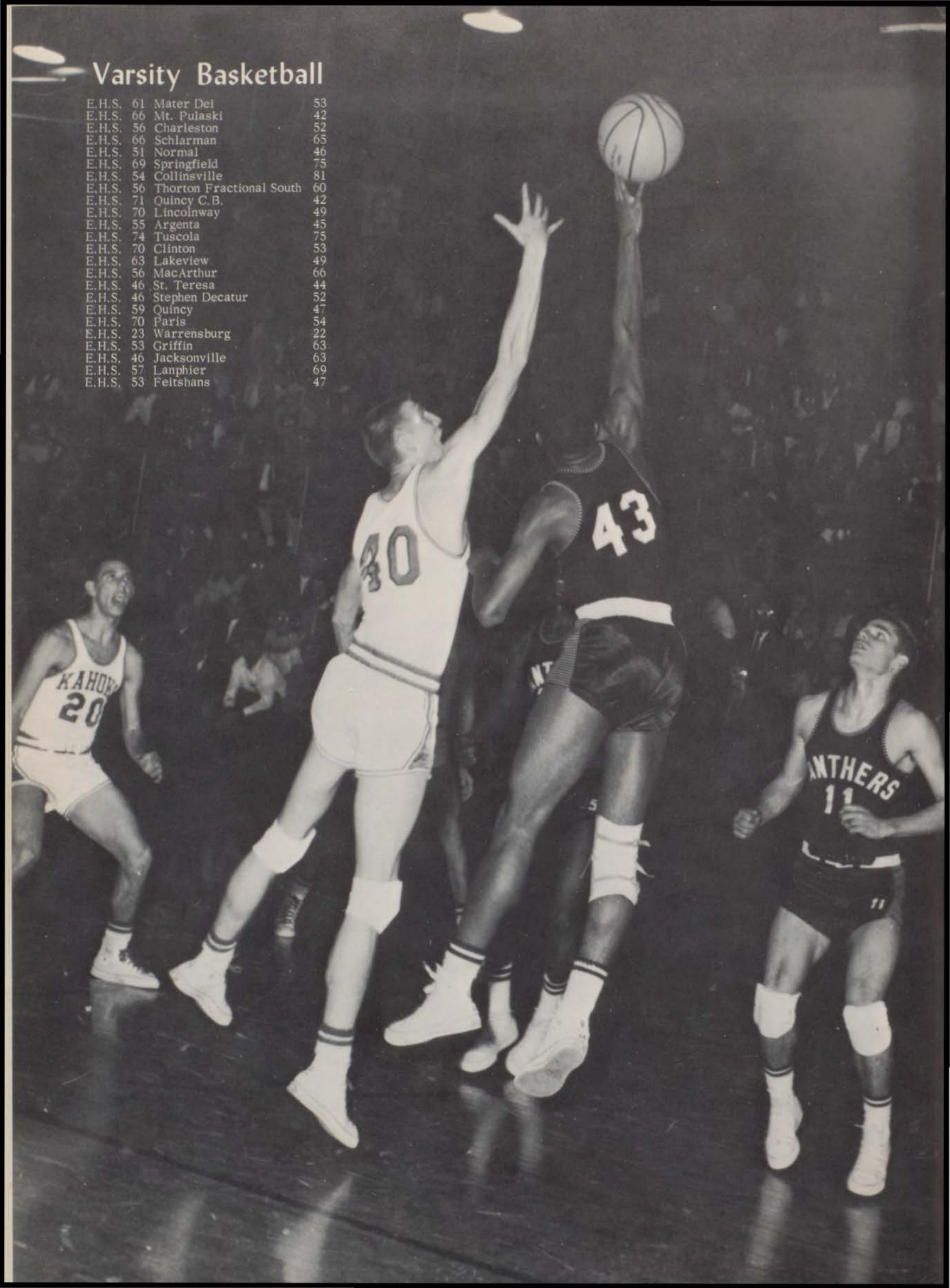

Entering the regionals, the Panthers had a 16-9 record. Fans will remember the high points of the season--the opening winning streak; the trip to Collinsville to meet one of the top ranking teams of the state; the consolation-bracket championship victory in the Paris Holiday Tournament; the excitement of the Round Robin city tourney; and the superior showing against Quincy and Paris during the first week in February.

The Panthers were in a rather unenviable position at the beginning of the season. With only three seniors on the squad, one suffering from a football injury, the juniors were heavily relied upon. 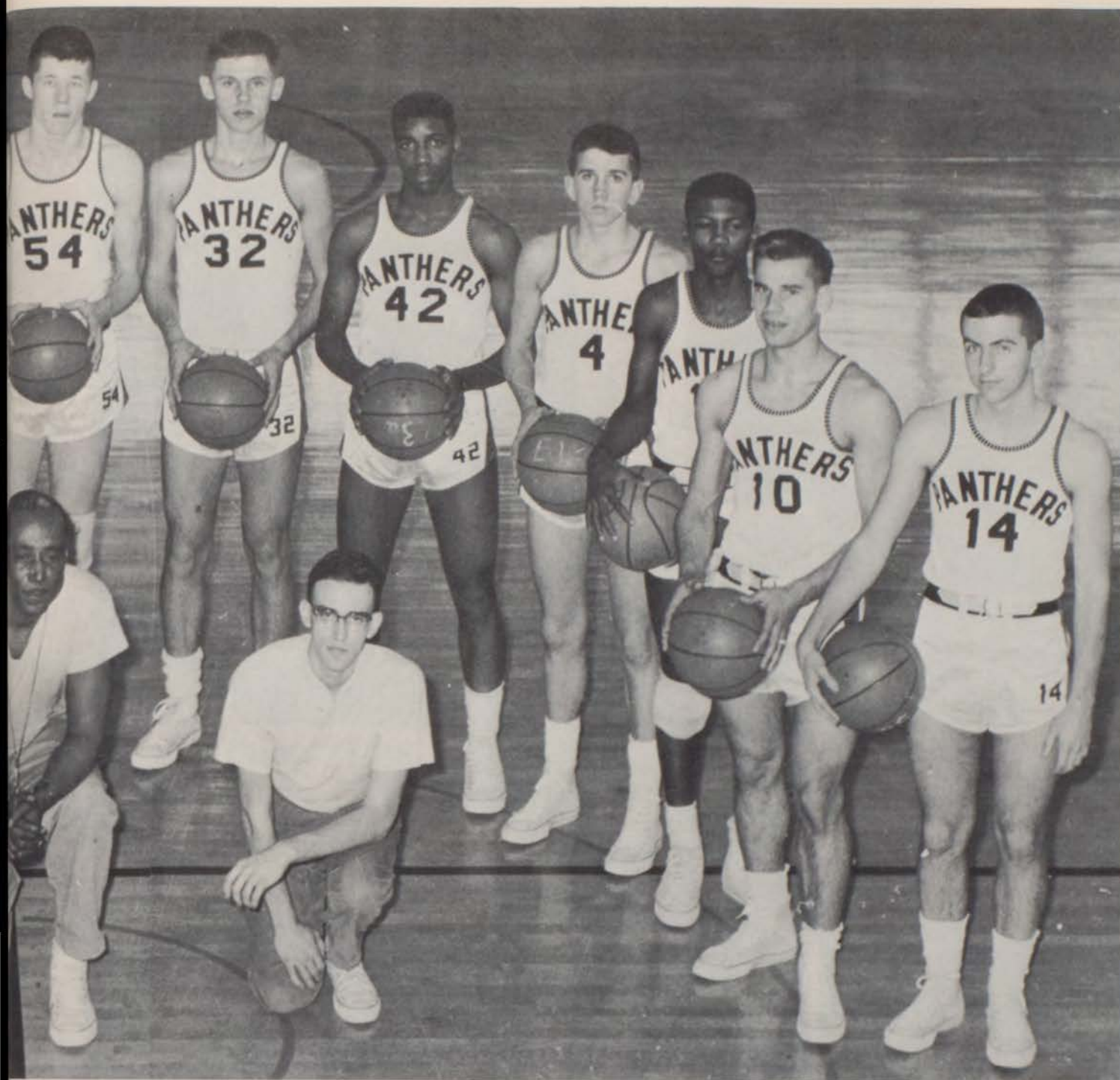
Kahoks still triumphed 81-54.

Fans cannot forget the 75-74 upset Tuscola handed Eisenhower because of a technical foul in the last minute of play. A team is allowed five time-outs a game. The Panthers called for a sixth time-out consequently losing a game in which they actually sank 28 field goals to Tuscola's 24.

Placing third in the Annual City Tournament, Eisenhower did a fair job of holding its own against the Decatur Reds and MacArthur Generals.

Returning to regular play Eisenhower pulled two upset victories in one weekend demonstrating outstanding team play and shooting percentages against the teams of Paris and Quincy. The Panthers really hustled and showed that they did

the end of the season, he was a leading rebounder and scored in double figures consistently.

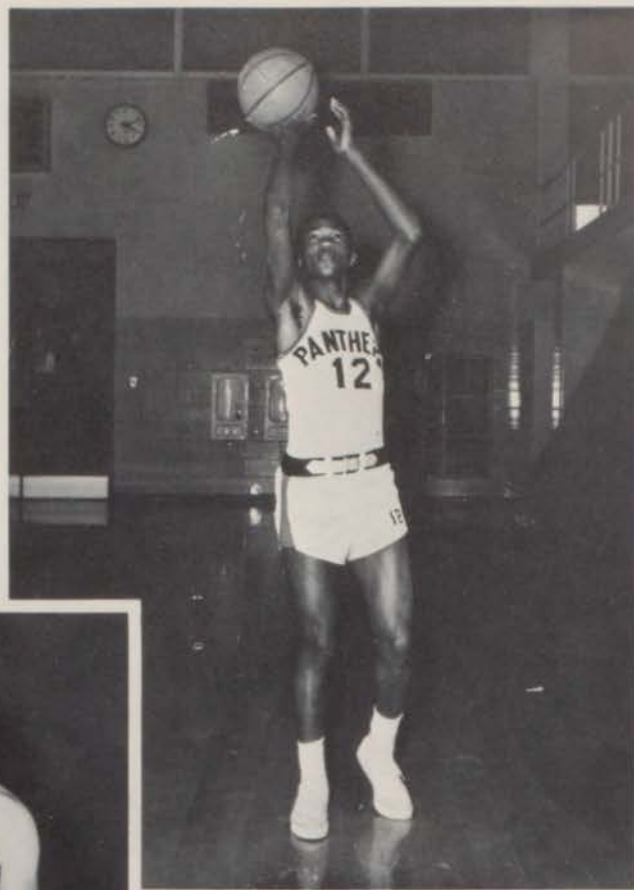

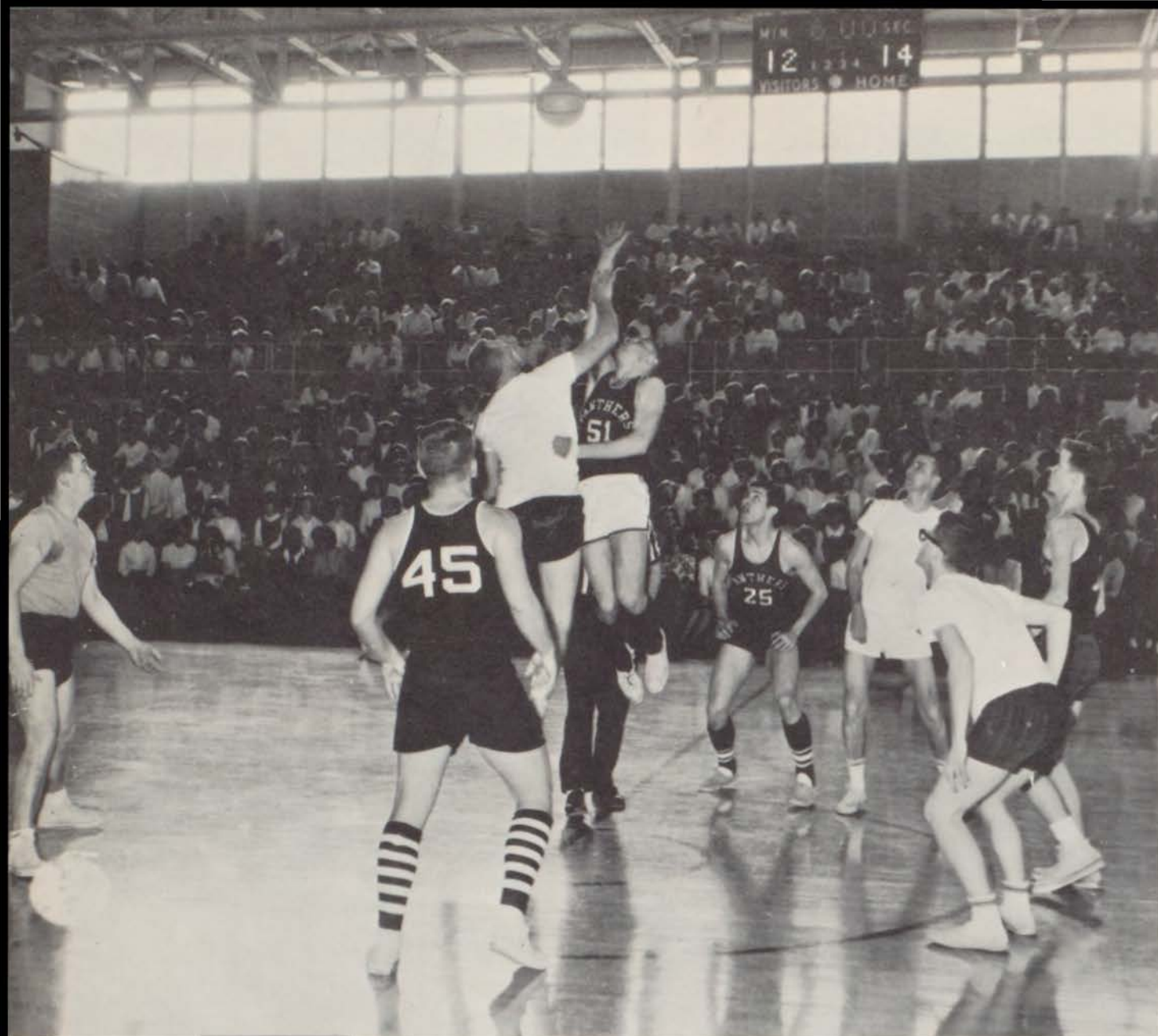
