On a sour note, the circle garden annuals burned up several times due to near 100 degree temperatures. The good thing was that the Japanese beetles were not interested.

In front of the main door to the Homestead, Bill replaced what he described as "ancient" spirea with ferns and hosta, which proved to be a popular choice. By the south porch several once beautiful viburnums succumbed to a disease, as yet undiagnosed. Yes, Bill takes leaves from ailing plants to the clinic, too.

As caretaker and botanist in residence (well, almost), Bill deserves our deepfelt thanks for all that he does to promote and preserve the plant life at the JMH. Our thanks to you, Bill.

lovely piece of furniture has come back to the Homestead – it's a sideboard – or is it? A part of the Millikin's dining room "suite" such a piece now would be a buffet or a server. Names seem to change more than the objects to whom they belong. For instance, window treatments common to the late nineteenth

century would have been portieres, heavier and more ornate than today's draperies, but serving similar decorative purpose, even though Anna disdained their use.

The bright flowerpots in present day sunrooms would have been called jardinières and the coat rack in the foyer would replace the ornate hall tree – the one with an umbrella stand to hold your parasol.

No more consigned the less-than-glamorous title "back parlor," the family room is the landing spot for the recliner which has superseded the Morris chair comfy for watching the plasma TV which in turn has replaced the hand-held kaleidoscope. The wind-up Swiss-movement music box filled the need for our multi-speakered audio system and surely the horsehair upholstered pieces were well protected from dust and stains with lacy antimacassars; no need for Naugahyde or Scotchguard.

Alphabet for a Good Child."


