COMMITTEE REPORTS FOR ANNUAL MEETING

This material is for your consideration in preparation for the Annual Meeting on April 26. Please bring it to the meeting.

PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS FOR 1978-79

County and Township Governments. Support for elimination of townships in Macon County with their functions transferred to general purpose governments, such as the county or municipalities.

Support for Home Rule status for the county with establishment of an elected county executive. (If necessary, we would support appointment of an administrator by the County Board until an executive can be elected.)

Decatur's Environmental Quality. Support for improved surface drainage of the City of Decatur, as proposed by the Surface Drainage Task Force and the Citizens Advisory Committee for Improved Storm Drainage.

Decatur Public Schools. Positions: The school district needs to make a continuing effort to determine the desires of the public concerning its schools. The Board of Education should present a "state of the schools" message at the end of each school year, and also describe plans for the next school year. The school district should continue to place a high priority on meeting the needs of individuals. The school district should increase its efforts to implement its goal of communications with the public.

When it is determined that projected revenues will not be sufficient to maintain and/or improve programs, the Board of Education of Decatur Public Schools should ask the voters to increase one or more of the tax rates making up the "operating tax rate" (CTR) for state funding.

Since there is a time lapse between voting an increase and receiving both local taxes and state funds based on the higher tax rates, referenda should be submitted before a crisis situation exists, that is, before cuts have to be made or a deficit exists in fund balances.

An increase in the tax rate would be justified to maintain and/or improve programs if:

Decatur's OTR was less than districts of similar size.

Decatur's OTR was less than needed to get maximum state funds.

Decatur Public Schools cont.

Proposed:

A study of the impact of declining enrollment n the Decatur Public Schools (closings, reorganization, reduction of staff, alternative schools, transportation.)

City Government. A restudy of the council-manager form of city government as it functions in Decatur. A study of the Home Rule option in city government and its capacity for improving economy and efficiency in Decatur. (The studies have been completed. The new position reached by consensus of our members will be substituted as soon as board approval is given.)

Court Monitoring. Local court monitoring of Felony Court. (Continuing.)
Proposed: Local court monitoring of Small Claims Court.

REPORT OF BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

Recommended changes:

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1. Officers. The following officers of the League of Women Voters of Decatur, Illinois shall be elected by the membership at an Annual Meeting and shall serve for terms of two years. They shall take office the first day of May.

Change to: They shall take office the first day of June.

Section 2. Elected Directors. There shall be six Elected Directors, three to be elected in the even-numbered years and three to be elected in the odd-numbered years, for terms of two years, by the general membership, They shall take office the first day of May. The elected Directors shall serve as needed to carry out the work of the League.

Change to: ... They shall take office the first day of June

Appointed Directors. The Officers and Elected Directors shall appoint such additional directors, not to exceed six, as they deem necessary to carry out the work of the League. The term of office of the Appointed Directors shall be one year and shall expire the first day of May.

Change to: ... and shall expire the first day of June.

Section 4. Qualifications. No person shall be elected or appointed to serve as an Officer or Director of this organization unless she is a voting member of the League of Women Voters of Decatur.

Change to: Only a voting member of the League of Women Voters of Decatur may be elected or appointed to serve as an Officer or Director of this organization.

ARTICLE VI. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. Fiscal Year, The fiscal year of the League of Women Voters of Decatur, Illinois, shall commence on the first day of April each year.

Change to:first day of May each year.

ARTICLE VI. Continued

Section 2. Dues. Annual dues of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) shall be payable on the first day of September in each year. Any member who fails to pay dues within two months after they become payable forfeits membership.

Change to: Annual dues, as proposed by the Board and approved by a majority vote of members present and voting at the Annual Meeting, shall be payable on the first day of September in each year.

ARTICLE VII Annual Meeting. An Annual Meeting shall be held in April, the Section 2 exact date to be determined by the Board of Directors.

Change to: The Annual Meeting shall be held in May, the exact date to be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Quorum. Twenty-two members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the League of Women Voters of Decatur, Illinois.

Change to: Twenty percent of the paid members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the League of Women Voters of Decatur, Illinois.

3. Administrative Committees

- a. Finance: cost of drive, supplies, postage, kits, publications, etc.
- b. Membership: kits for new members, orientations, publications, supplies; any incurred encouraging membership, including postage.

c. Yearbook: publishing costs.

d. Unit organization: babysitter, refreshments, room rentals, etc.

e. Public relations. Publicity notices to news media; expenses incurred in promoting league activities that do not come specifically under Membership, Finance, Voter Service, Educational activities or Position.

C. Delegates, travel, and affiliations.

*1. State Convention - odd years.

*2. National Convention - even years.

*3. Workshops - conducted every year by the State League.

* Amount budgeted covers travel expense and other fees as the board.

4. Affiliations and Coalitions

a. The Central Illinois World Affairs Conference provides continuing education opportunities for the people of Decatur and surrounding area.

b. Other coalitions: registration fees or other monies used for support or participation in the work of programs of interest to League.

D. Financial support for LWV organization.

- 1. Paid annually to State League in support of services. Per member assessment.
- 2. Paid annually to National League in support of services. A per member assessment based on the number of members as of January 1st of each year.

 Amount per member is decided at national convention.

E. Bulletin. Includes stencils, mimeograph paper, postage.

F. Educational activities.

- 1. Publications: purchase or production of fact sheets by resource committees.
- 2. Program committees. Impartial study and impartial community activities may be budgeted here. The cost of committee research, including impartial publications, may be budgeted here if such material is distributed to the public as well as to League members.

3. Voters Service.

- a. Voters guides includes all publications giving information to voters, including candidates questionnaires and programs for candidates mtgs.
- b. Candidates Meetings. Cost of room rentals and other expenses of mtg. c. Voters Directory. Cost of publishing and distribution.

G. Position Support.

- 1. Publications purchase, production and distribution in support of League positions.
- 2. Action Expenses of all League activities which touch upon consensus and League positions: lobbying, travel to legislature, public meetings, and committee expenses which cannot be included in Section F.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

April 26, 1978

President, Karen Jensen, called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. at the home of Sue Marshall, 155 South Glencoe, with a quorum of 22, plus 5, members present.

A committee was appointed to read and approve the minutes of the meeting.

Members of the committee are Marg Coberly, Kathy Sorensen and Lucille Crow.

Karen Jensen gave a review of the 1977-78 League year. Highlights were distribution of 2,400 copies of our Voter's Directory, monitoring Felony Court, observers covering the County Board and City Council, progress on a directory of juvenile services, registering people to vote, and participating in the Public Forum on health last year, and on the family this year. In addition, testifying before the school board on League's school positions, and before the Committee on Intergovernmental Cooperation on juvenile facilities for Decatur and Macon County.

BY-LAWS. The proposed changes in by-laws were outlined by Florence Cox, committee chairwoman. She suggested consideration of the changes having to do with dates first. She moved, and the motion was seconded by Betty Jacobsen, that the changes in Article V, Sections 1, 2 and 3 be adopted. Motion carried. (Officers and elected directors shall take office the first day of June rather than the first day of May. The one-year terms of appointed directors shall expire the first day of June.) Florence Cox moved, second by Betty Jacobsen, that Article VI, Section 1, be amended as proposed. Motion carried. (Fiscal year to begin on the first day of May rather than the first day of April.) It was moved and seconded, by Florence Cox and Betty Jacobsen, that the proposed change in Article VII, Section 2, be approved. The motion carried. (The Annual Meeting shall be held in May rather than in April.)

It was moved by Florence Cox, with a second by Barbara Brown, that the proposed change in Article VI, Section 2, be adopted. The motion carried. (Change from specific amount of dues to "Annual dues, as proposed by the Board and approved by a majority vote of members present and voting at the Annual Meeting")

Florence Cox moved, with a second by Betty Jacobsen, that the change in Article VII, Section 4, be adopted. The motion carried. (Change to "Twenty percent of the paid members shall constitute a quorum . . . " from "Twenty-two members shall constitute a quorum")

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BUDGET. Chairwoman Laura Verbanac presented the budget. It was pointed out that this budget would cover thirteen months because of the by-law changes. During discussion the following changes were made in the proposed budget. The Unit Organization allotment was raised to \$100 from \$75. We will try to increase non-member contributions in the finance drive by that amount. Since we will not have a delegate to National Convention this year, the \$400 allocated for expenses was shifted to State Convention next year. Total amount of budget-\$3,186.25. It was proposed by Laura Verbanac and seconded by Beth Oldweiler that dues be set at \$20,00. Diane Basten moved to amend the proposal to \$17.50. The motion was seconded by Carol. Campbell, and discussion followed. The amendment did not pass. The original motion carried, and the budget was then adopted with the changes indicated.

PROGRAM. Beth Oldweiler presented the items recommended by the board for 1978-79 local program. Present support positions on County and Township Government, Decatur's Environmental Quality, Decatur Public Schools, and City Government were approved. New studies regarding the impact of declining enrollment on Decatur Public Schools, and monitoring of Small Claims Court were adopted. No non-recommended items were submitted.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS. Pat McVay presented the slate of officers for 1978—1979. Barbara Brown announced that she wished to withdraw her name from nomination as president and, with Karen's permission, to nominate Karen Jensen for president. Barbara Emery said she would like to withdraw her name from nomination as an elected director. There were no other nominations from the floor. Beth Oldweiler moved that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for the revised slate. The motion carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS. A person to serve as liason between the state office and Decatur for action on the Equal Rights Amendment is needed. This would be a paid job, for two weeks.

Members present were urged to write Representatives and Senators with regard to support of the ERA, and to thank Representative Dunn, Governor Thompson and Mayor Bilandic for their support.

Activities have been planned for Sun Day, Wednesday, May 3, in Central Parks a slide show, play, musicians and solar tour. Members were urged to take part.

Lola Smith and Maggie Lauterjung have been working on the World Affairs Conference on the family and wished to remind League members that reservations are due.

The meeting adjourned at 10:25 p.m.

There DAY will be displays, working models, slides, self-guided tours of solar homes in the area. LWV is asked for support in contacting merchants, asking them to make displays. Board agreed to this. An article will go into the Voter.

Pinance Sue Marshall gave names of persons who had not responded to Drive letters asking for donations for LWV. Board members took cards of personal acquaintances and will make personal appeals.

There was extended discussion about the difficulties of fund-raising.
