The Author and

Play presentation is the business of re-creating an author's vision for his audience. Because the most important element of a vision is the moving spirit behind it—the heart which impels a play on the stage forward and makes it live and breathe—let us pause for a moment for a thumbnail sketch of the author of the Lakeview program, Frederick I. Godshalk.

Mr. Godshalk was claimed as a native of Bangor, Pennsylvania, on July 6, 1903. There he attended the public schools, graduating from high school in Easton, Pennsylvania, in 1921 and from Lafayette College in 1925. Subsequently, a Master of Arts degree was conferred on him by the University of Illinois where he has also completed additional graduate work.

His first job was on a newspaper at Easton, followed by educational position at Staunton Military Academy in Virginia. During World War II he served the Army as a member of the General Staff in Washington, D. C., becoming Assistant Commandant at the School for Personnel Services, Campus of Washington and Lee University. He was Assistant Commandant at founding of Army Information School at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania.

Recently he served with the High School Visitor's office and in Research, Office of Provost, at the University of Illinois.

Mrs. Godshalk's home was in Spartanburg, South Carolina. She is a graduate of Winthrop College and holds a Master's degree from Boston University.

The Godshalks are proud of their two children, daughter Rickey, age 7, and son, John, age 4.

Unfailingly friendly, interested and exceedingly competent, with a keen sense of humor, Mr. Godshalk is our guide and inspiration. His ideas of education will be the foundation of our happiness and well being. Because we realize these things we dedicate our book to the AUTHOR AND THE IDEA.

The Lakeview program centers around the core curriculum and has for its basic design the tenet that "Freedom is everybody's business."

Here in the author's own words is a brief explanation.

We start with the idea that many things which happen in a high school are useless, and that some are negative or harmful. It is useless to require many pupils to memorize facts in order to be examined in the memory of facts as such. Not only is the memory of facts so learned a very brief one; but the usefulness or purpose of a knowledge of facts, which is to serve the understanding of principles and to prompt the habit of judgment based upon evidence, is never impressed upon the pupil even in the rare cases when it is important to the teacher.

It is also useless, sometimes harmful, to teach that one book is always right and that nothing is required of an educated person except a fair recollection of "what the book says." The result is a careless and uncritical acceptance of the judgment of others, which is poor preparation for a self-governing citizen. It is useless, too, to teach as if "education" consisted of "learning" the so-called "school subjects," each of which is independent of all other subjects, is "good for you" as a matter of something called "culture," and bears the same relation to life that a petrified tree does to a forest, or a zoo to a jungle.

It is harmful to assume that education is almost static in a world that is dynamic, changing so fast that the wisest can hardly judge the course and outcome of events. It is harmful to spend so much time in this artificial and superficial world of books and things that there is no time to consider the problems of the mature citizen or to attend to the vital concerns of people approaching maturity. It is harmful to treat such persons as children, required to do as they are told, never to ask why, assume no responsibility for their own individual or group actions in the school, and accept grades as payment for the doing of futile, childish tasks.

It is better to know that public education is for the many, and that it is free because it is supposed to be socially useful. Upon these ideas we base the differences of the modern school. This is a school which works at being useful, and not a mere decorative corner of the work-shop of life. It is a school which *requires* as much growing-up as each child can manage . . .

It sets up a program of "general education" to break down the independence of the school subjects and to apply many things "covered in" such subjects to the problems of living, as well as to go far beyond the scope of most subjects taught in the old-fashioned school.

It arranges for as much freedom from the idea of "one subject, one book" as the individual teacher can manage . . . and it emphasizes understanding more than memorizing.

It regards all that happens in the school as a part of cooperative enterprise, the aim of which is education. Hence it uses the governing of the school for practice in self-government, "extra-curricular" activities for social planning and group skills, and each daily contact for the most important job of all, the job of growing up.

HISTORY OF BOARD ACTION

- June 4, 1945—Board of Education voted to hold election to buy site.
- August 13, 1945—Signed option for site.
- Sept. 18, 1945—Advised bond sale for October 8, 1945.
- Oct. 8, 1945—Sold \$125,000 bonds 15 yr. maturity—2¼% int.
- Feb. 15, 1946—Election on \$125,000 bond issue—carried 7-1.
- May 17, 1946—Second election on site—carried 95-0.
- Oct. 17, 1946—Board and Supt. Green met with following state officials at Decatur Club: C. C. Beyerly, First Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Otis Keeler, Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Harold Trimble, High School Visitor's Office, University of Illinois; Lowell Fisher, High School Visitor's Office, University of Illinois; Robert M. - Feb. 17, 1947—Signed contract with Quail & Co. of Davenport, Iowa, for sale of additional bonds.
- Feb. 21, 1947—Employed L. V. DeWitt as architect.
- April 12, 1947—Second Bond Election \$725,000 carried 6-1. Bonds 20 yr. maturity, 2.65% interest.
- March 13, 1948—Voted New Lakeview Community Unit District No. 4.
- April 14, 1948—Building contracts signed.
- July 1, 1948—New Lakeview Unit District became effective.
- Feb. 28, 1949—New Unit re-voted \$310,000 bonds (which were not sold in second issue of April 12, 1947).

One of the outstanding achievements of the year was the completion of the building—long in splendor, rich in newness; a monarch among schools.

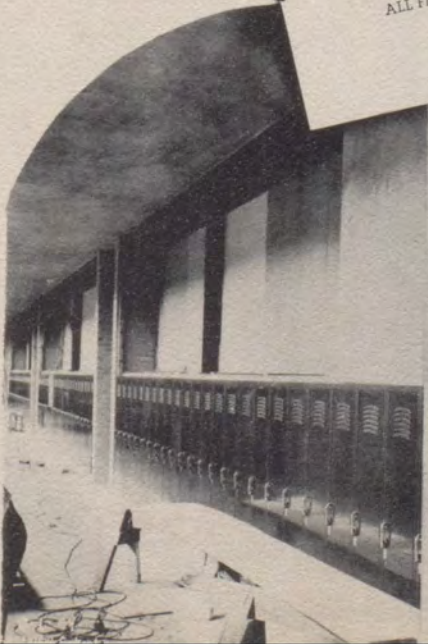
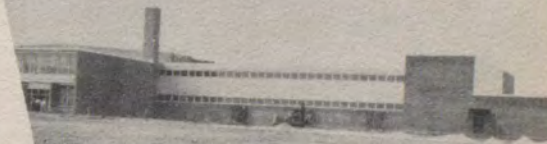

THE Lakeview Community district was organized into a unit on July 1, 1948. This new district comprising approximately 100 square miles in Macon County, encloses four elementary schools, Brush College 1, Brush College 2, Eldorado and Excelsior South and a combination Junior-Senior High School.

Of the 1614 pupils in the district, 220 attend Senior High, 198 are in Junior High, and 1,196 are enrolled in the grade schools. Two buses transport 390 of these children daily. The total number of teachers in the district is 55 with nine non-teaching personnel. The principals are Mr. Hubert E. Brown of Brush College 1, Mr. C. Ray Petty of Brush College 2, Mr. Hollis R. Sallee of Excelsior South, and Mr. Paul Swearingen of Eldorado. Mr. Frederick I. Godshalk is principal of the new Junior-Senior High school.

All of these schools, their problems and personnel come under the jurisdiction of the eminently capable, co-operative and far-seeing Board of Education. It has worked quietly and consistently behind the scenes providing the unifying control, which is the function of a great producer in a major production.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Mr. Green — SUPERINTENDENT

There is one man who, more than any other one person, has been the spark behind the organization and the extensive building program of the district—H. B. Green, Superintendent.

Mr. Green has had a unique record. Coming to Brush College No. 2 in 1939 as principal and 8th grade teacher, he soon became known as a leader in recognizing and solving community problems. One of his first achievements was the establishment of a recreational center in co-operation with the Decatur Park Board.

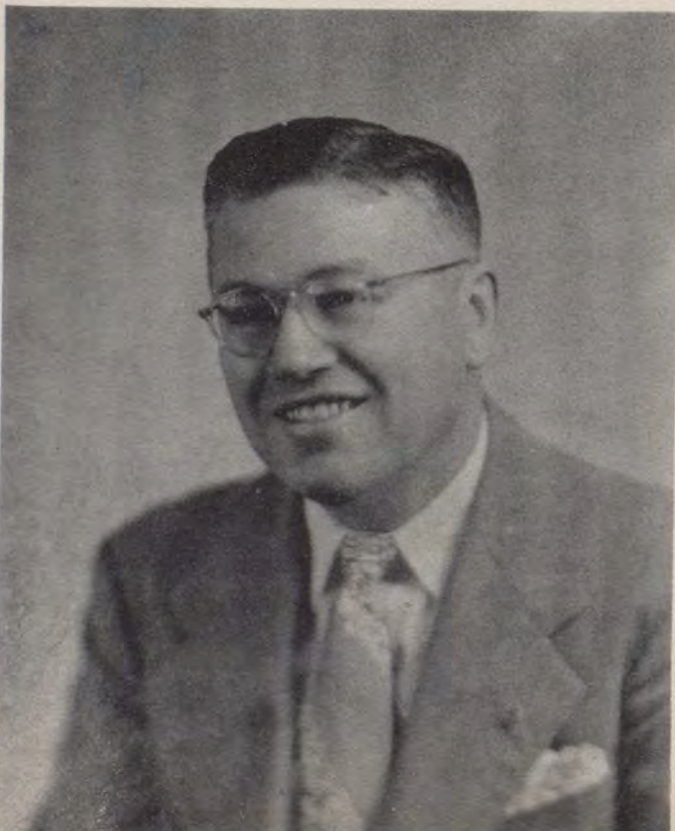
In 1942, he became superintendent of the two Brush College schools with a principal at each school. He continued to advocate to the Board of Education that a complete and long range building program be initiated to care for the rapidly increasing enrollment. The war delayed this move but in 1947 a bond issue was passed for the construction of a new Junior-Senior High School. In 1948, organization was completed with the establishment of the Lakeview Unit District No. 4 and the absorption of two more grade schools: Excelsior South and Eldorado. Mr. Green was the happy choice for superintendent of the Unit.

This year (1949-50) Grades 7 thru 12 entered this new building. Also, four new rooms were added to Eldorado school. Remaining on the building program are two new buildings to replace Brush College No. 1 and No. 2.

In addition to the building program a review of the achievements accomplished by Superintendent Green's ten years of service must include: establishment of permanent record system, full testing program, physical education and health programs, kindergartens, music supervision, outstanding P-T.A.s, total faculty membership in NEA and IEA, board membership in Illinois State School Board Association, year-round school program, bus transportation, more adequate tax base for school revenue, better qualified teachers, better salary schedule, cafeteria manager over all five schools and the securing of a new type of program in the high school.

Superintendent Green is well qualified educationally, holding a Bachelor of Education degree from Illinois Normal University, 1943, and Master of Science degree, University of Illinois, 1945, with advanced study. Previous experience was 15 years in Champaign and DeWitt counties as teacher and principal.

The Green family from the very first has made its home in the district. Mrs. Green, friendly and capable, taught six years in the community and for the last three years has served as a substitute teacher. A son, Milton, is at present in his first year at the University of Illinois College of Medicine and a daughter, Barbara, is a sophomore at Illinois State Normal University, majoring in business education.



This year the community was saddened and complimented by the resignation of Mr. Green. He had been chosen by the Pekin Board of Education to head their system.

This is a big promotion and the Staff joins his many friends in congratulating Mr. Green and thanking him for his untiring leadership, and in wishing him success in his new position.

Introducing

COMMENTS ON LEAVING LAKEVIEW SCHOOL SYSTEM:

"During my ten years' stay at Lakeview the community has witnessed 'growing pains.' This growth and its attendant school problems has been very challenging to me as superintendent. I feel that by way of organization we have moved a considerable distance along the road of progress, but Lakeview school district has a long way to go to achieve a complete building program which is necessary to provide adequate educational opportunities for all its boys and girls.

"It is quite difficult for Mrs. Green and me to leave our home and many friends when we go to Pekin. We feel that this community is our home and that we are a part of it. The community has been good to us. Undoubtedly the ten years here have been the most interesting and happiest of my 25 years' teaching.

"However, in going to Pekin I feel that the larger community is an advancement that I cannot refuse to accept. I am leaving a faculty capable of administering a superior school system. I am leaving a Board of Education which has given me the opportunity to exercise educational leadership. I am leaving a community which wants good schools and is willing to vote the money to support them."

MESSAGE TO THE STUDENTS OF LAKEVIEW HIGH:

"The building, the faculty and the program have been provided for you by your community. Whether or not you profit by a high school education or not depends entirely upon YOU. The best of buildings, faculty and programs are only factors in your education. The most important item for consideration is YOU.

"Recently I heard a school superintendent address a graduating class of 400 seniors. His opening remark was, 'Will you amount to a "tinker's damn"?'"

"Isn't this a challenging question for students leaving high school? Let's think about it during your high school days at Lakeview.

"I have known most of the students at Lakeview through grade school. You have been friendly and co-operative and I have enjoyed working with you and for you in securing better educational opportunities. I expect to hear great and good things about you in the future. Success to all of you."

A thumbnail sketch of Mr. Henson would bring these facts to view:

Birthplace: Xenia, Illinois; year: 1916. After graduation from Flora High School, he attended Southern Illinois University. Married during his second year there; he dropped out of college and began teaching career at the age of 20. The rest of his college preparation was completed during the summer months earning for him an A. B. degree from Eastern Illinois State Teachers' College and an M. A. degree from University of Illinois.

Rural schools in Wayne County, Illinois, were the scenes of his first pedagogical efforts. In 1940, Mr. Henson became principal of the elementary school in Cisne, Ill. In 1941, he moved to Sullivan to teach history in the Junior High School. In 1942, he was employed by Neoga High School as Science instructor and coach. Then followed an interlude of 17 months' service in the Army where he served in the Intelligence Department as criminal investigator, and as Chief of Section, Classification, Counseling and Separation at Fort Lewis.

Upon discharge, Mr. Henson accepted the position as Superintendent of Lovington Consolidated Elementary Schools, coming to Brush College No. 1 in May, 1949. He helped inaugurate the new program as assistant principal of Lakeview Junior and Senior High School this past year, and in May, succeeded to the job of Superintendent of the Lakeview Community district.

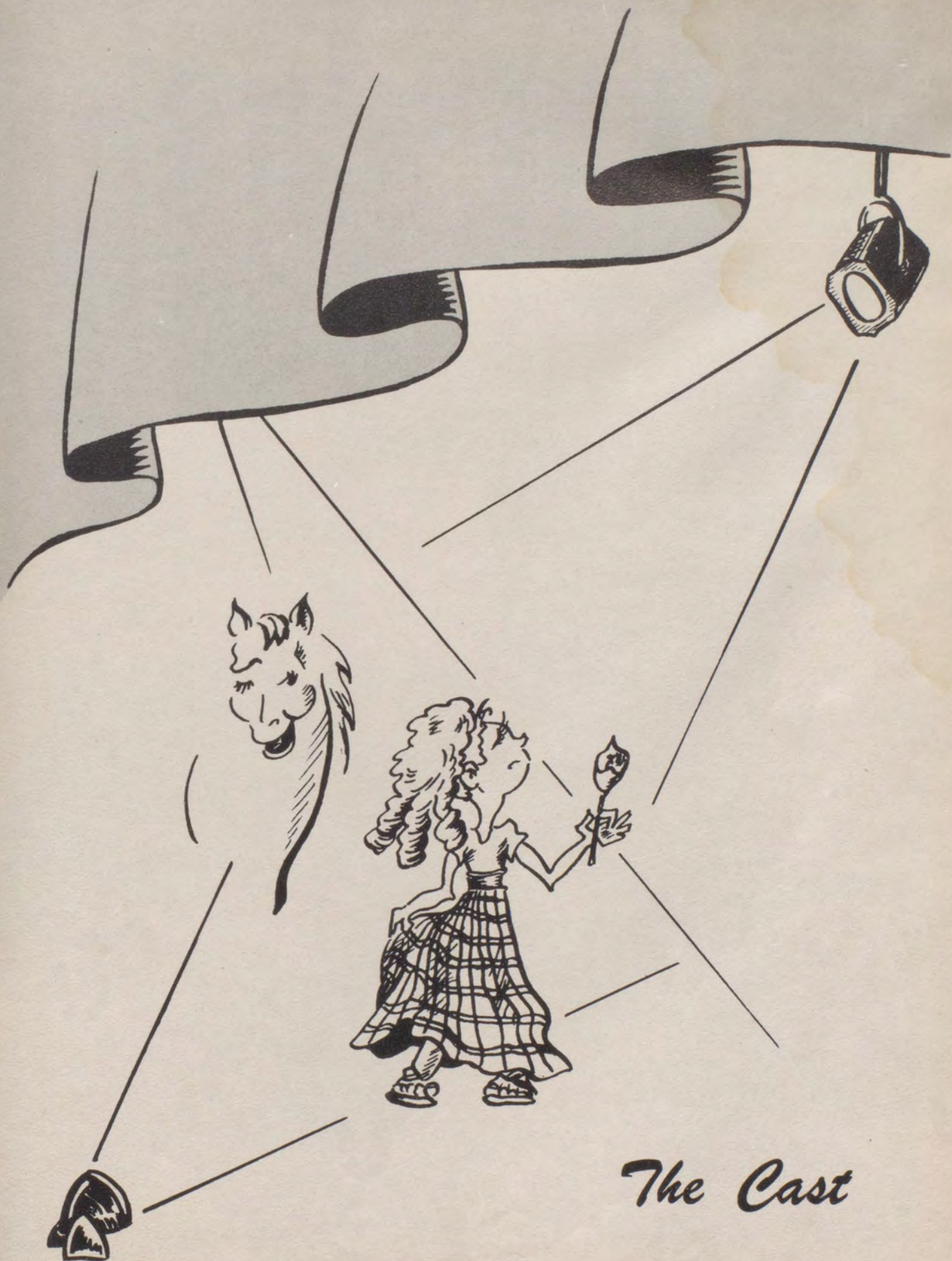
Mr. and Mrs. Henson reside with small son, Steve, at 2216 East Decatur.

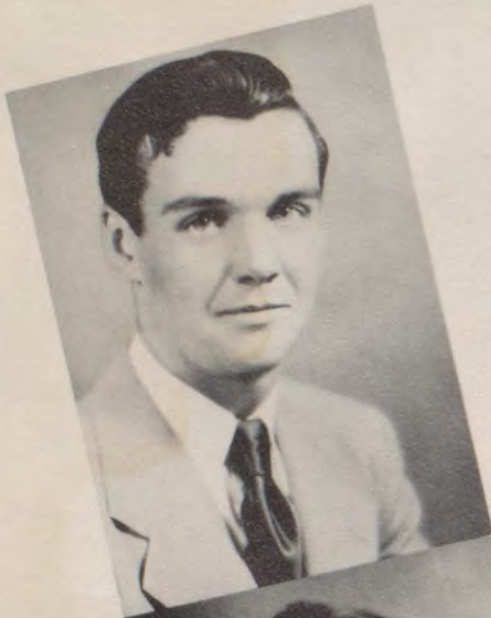
THE SENIORS

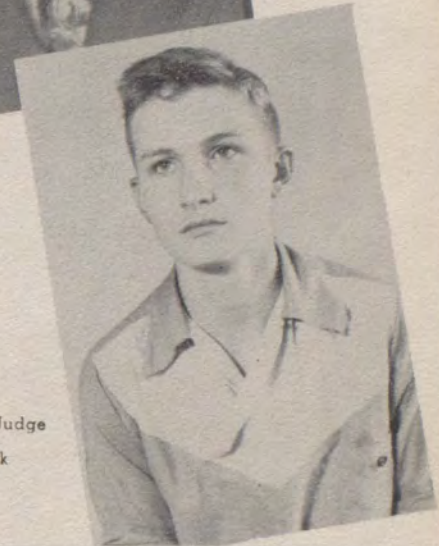
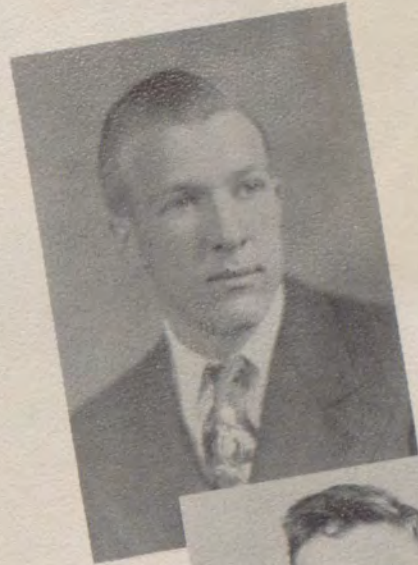
The Student Court is an organization wherein the student government places its judicial power. Its membership is composed of students who secure their position by popular vote.
