






THEME



The Montague Girl meanwhile has fallen hook, line, and sinker for Merton, and she makes him see that he is much better at making comedies than he is at serious work.


Finally Merton discovers his place is in comedies, and he finds he can be contented with them, that is, if the Montague Girl is still around.















NOVEMBER 30—The Reds started the season off with a bang by defeating Tuscola 52 to 28 at Decatur.


DECEMBER 3—The Reds came forth and won their first Big 12 game by defeating Bloomington 36 to 30 on our floor.

DECEMBER 17—Corray and incorporated of Urbana handed the Reds their first beating by a three point margin, 25 to 28. The game was played at Urbana.





Bob Doster: "Chick", the team's captain and scoring punch, was second in Big 12 scoring honors. Chick is only a junior and will return next year for another good season.




DECEMBER 18—Decatur returned home the following night and handed the Feitshans of Springfield a terrific beating. The score read 51 to 25.

JANUARY 7—Coming back in great style, Decatur downed Mattoon on our floor with a 36 to 26 score.



JANUARY 25—Again Urbana knocked Decatur off their perch in the Big 12 race by taking a close 49 to 45 victory from the Reds.


JANUARY 28—Repeat. The Reds gave bloomington a 56 to 44 beating at Bloomington. This was their second victory over Bloomington.






FEBRUARY 19—The Reds traveled to Quincy, Saturday, only to come home defeated by three points. The final was 45 to 42 for Quincy.

Jim Stollard: Jim, a senior, was a very fast player and will not return next year. He had two years experience on the "B" squad.






FEBRUARY 20—New high! The Reds poured it on to hit a new high in Decatur history by defeating Tri-City in their first regional game by the score of 88 to 20.

John Ziese: This is his second year of basketball at Decatur High, and he played often during the season. John will return next year, for he is also a junior.






