

BARTLETT FAMILY GROUP

This family group is composed of Anna Millikin's grandparents, Henry and Betsey Bartlett, four of their daughters and Henry's brother, unnamed. The family history states Henry is front row, center, but it seems more likely Henry is at far right, with youngerlooking man at center being his brother. Henry's wife Betsey is third from left, back row, with twins Theresa and Betsey, on either side. Front row left is Joanna, and back row left, a daughter identified as probably Mary.

History — Pictures Trace Anna Millikin's Family Line

No family album exists at the Millikin Homestead to document the appearance of Anna Millikin's ancestors, but an intriguing glimpse of relatives can be found in the history of her maternal line, the Bartletts.

In the published family history, Dawes-Gates Ancestral Lines, Vol. II, there is a small but excellent collection of pictures for several generations. The Bartletts were sea-faring people who came to this country ca. 1660 and settled first in Massachusetts. (The story of their line was presented in an earlier The Homestead Family Gazette.)

Pictures begin with Anna's great grandparents, Captain William and Joanna (Herrick) Bartlett, who lived during the Revolutionary War in which Captain Bartlett (1741-1794) served as a naval agent for the Colonies. Since the couple date before the time of photography, their portraits, luckily, were painted.

For the next generation, there are pictures of Bartlett's son Henry (1771-1850) and his wife, Betsey (Corey) Bartlett. In addition, a group photograph shows both


Henry and Betsey as well as some of their twelve children. Although one daughter is not positively identified, it seems that their daughter, Hettie, mother of Anna Millikin, is not included in the picture. No photograph of Hettie (1804-1886) is known.

Since Anna did not have children, her direct line came to a close in four generations from the Revolution, but the line of her maternal aunt, Joanna (Bartlett) Shipman, sister to Hettie, may continue to this day. One of Joanna's five children was Betsey (Shipman) Gates, first cousin to Anna, and grandmother of Charles Gates Dawes, Vice President of the United States under President Calvin Coolidge. Dawes was, therefore, Anna's first cousin, twice removed. He lived 1865-1951.


Pictures suggest that Anna bore a resemblance to a number of relatives. The accompanying photographs offer the opportunity for comparison.




