
CARRIAGE HOUSE CLASSES FILLED EARLY

Pottery is being taught by Larry Calhoun, who was assistant professor of art in ceramics at Millikin University from 1963 until 1970. (Coincidentally, he and his family lived in the Millikin Homestead when it was the Decatur Art Center.)

Other workshops include Crystal Growing, Chemistry, Cooking for Kids, Astronomy, Growing Bonsai Trees, Metric Cooking, Poetry writing, Carpentry, Drawing, Solar Energy and Pre-School sessions in Art, Science and Music.

"Saturday Drop-ins" — afternoons when children can come and participate in whatever is happening for 50 cents — were held twice.

Two schools are participating in special workshops arranged during school hours. Our Lady of Lourdes is having a 6-week session on Fridays and Holy Family is having a 4-week session on Wednesdays. The Neighborhood Arts Program, sponsored by Richland Community College and the Decatur Area Arts Council, is coming to the Carriage House on Wednesdays and Thursdays for Pottery and Jewelrymaking.

Volunteers from the DOVE program have added another dimension...one retired man donated his services to teach an electricity class...an enthusiastic 74-year-old woman is doing clerical and phone work.

The next four-week session of workshops will begin in May, with registration from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 27.

And if you'd like to be an instructor, offer an idea for a class, help plan the program or be part of the active committee...we welcome you to an exciting adventure! The first Patroness Workshop was a busy, happy day for the women sewing gingham aprons, stuffing calico wreaths for the Fall Festival in the upstairs bedroom of the Homestead on April 6.
