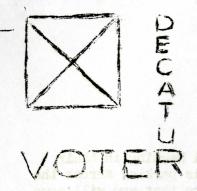

DECATUR SCHOOL COMMITTEE The committee met several times in the Fall of 1976, to try to determine the direction it would take in its study of the local schools. Members of the committee individually did some investigating into several aspects of the school programs which attempt to deal with the child other than in the traditional classroom setting. These involve such things as the school for pregnant girls, in-school suspension rooms, and special education.

Early in 1977, the committee decided it needed a broader view of attempts of the district to educate each child to her needs. A schedule of interviews of board... & administrative people was set up. The thrust of the interviews is to be: what are the goals or objectives of the district, are they being met, and if not, how can they be met. These opinions will be compared and collated. After presenting these findings to the League membership, they will be asked to try to answer the same questions and arrive at a consensus about the needs and goals of the district, on May 11, 1977.

ENERGY Our energy committee began a study of the energy situation in November of 1976. On February 9, 1977, we presented to our League members an energy up-date program, summarizing current and future methods of producing energy, and concentrating on nuclear energy, solar energy and energy conservation.

We put together a slide show using our own slides, as well as those of Dr. Al Casella of Sangamon State University (solar energy installations in Illinois and elsewhere) and of Jerry Baker of the University of Illinois Extension Office at Champaign, Illinois (solar grain dryers in Illinois).

URBAN STORMATER DRAINAGE TASKFORCE The Decatur League is represented on a Local Steering Committee of the Task Force on Urban Stormwater, a State EPA continuing planning program to achieve water quality. The CPP is based on the 1972 Amendments to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. Two sections - 208 and 303 - require each state to have a CPP that will produce overall plans for water pollution control in the state.

The first step in the CPP is to review goals and objectives, priorities, water quality standards, and guidelines for water pollution control. This will help the State to identify problems and solutions to water quality problems on a year-to-year basis and insure public participation in water quality management.

The statewide Urban Stormwater Task Force will meet every other month, with the Local Steering Committees meeting in the month between.

Physical data will be collected this spring and summer by the Illinois State Water Survey in eight sub-area cities, of which Decatur will be one. The plan is to monitor two basins, one south of Lake Decatur and the other in an urban area, as well as Stevens Creek and estimate loads from rural and unmodeled urban areas.

Once the water pollution problems have been identified the State will have some ideas with which to control and better manage water quality.

This League is also represented on a Citizen Advisory Committee for Improved Storm Drainage for the City of Decatur. This Committee is to promote participation from both city officials and the public for better storm drainage in Decatur. The Committee has been inactive since the bond issue of the Spring of 1976 was passed.

#### MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

#### April 13, 1977

President, Barbara Brown, called the meeting to order at 8:15 p.m. at the YWCA, with a quorum of 22, plus 3, members present.

A committee was appointed to read and approve the minutes of the Annual Meeting. Members of the committee are Doe Walsh, Marg Coberly, and Lucille Crow.

Treasurer, Chris Langer, presented a year end report indicating a balance in the checking account as of March 31, 1977 of \$1,015.18, with \$83.31 in the savings account. The Treasurer's Report was accepted.

Barbara Brown said that an audit had not been made of the books as yet. An Audit Committee was appointed. Members are: Elise Hurst, Florence Cox, and Dee Meyerson.

The proposed budget of \$2,992.50 for 1977-78 was presented by Treasurer, Chris Langer. After discussion, Milli Protzman moved adoption of the budget. Carol Campbell seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Program Chairwoman, Karen Jensen, presented the program items recommended for local study by the board. She moved their consideration and the motion was seconded and carried. The board recommended continuing our positions with regard to County and Township Governments, Decatur's Environmental Quality, and continuing our current study of Decatur PublicSchools, which will be completed in April, 1977. New studies recommended are: a study of the financial resources and condition of School District #61; a re-study of the council-manager form of city government in Decatur and the Home Rule option in city government; and local court monitoring of Felony Court. After discussion, these program items were approved as our local Program for 1977-78. A question was raised with regard to carrying forward the present school study since it will be completed within the current program year. It was agreed to check with State Board to see how this should be handled in the future.

The President requested that Parliamentarian, Barbara Ohlsen, read our by-law which concerns submission of non-board-recommended items for program. After discussion, it was decided that the meeting would allow suggestions from the floor. Doe Walsh moved consideration of a study of abortion in Decatur. The motion failed. It was the consensus of the meeting that this was not a study which falls within local jurisdiction. Beth Oldweiler proposed that the meeting consider a study of the need for a new source of water for Decatur, and, if it is needed, determine what source. A majority voted against consideration.

#### EXPERIMENTS

- A. Operating costs
  - 1. General Supplies: includes stationery, anvelopes, ditto paper, etc.
  - 2. Postage. All postage except for bulletin, finance drive, membership, 3. Telephone and telegraph. League business calls.
  - 4. Bank charges. Service charge for handling checking account.
- B. Board ani coministrative committees
  - I. President: to cover miscellaneous expenses.
  - 2. Board tools and expenses: duplicate President's Mailings, Mational Board Reports, Local League Handbooks; publications necessary for board portfolios.
  - 3. Administrative committees
    - a. Finance: cost of drive, supplies, postage, printing, kits, publications.
    - b. Membership: kits for new members, orientations, publications, supplies; any expense incurred encouraging membership, including postage.
    - c. Yearbook: publishing costs.
    - d. Unit organisation: babysitter, refreshments, room rentals, etc.
    - e. Public relations. Publicity notices to news media; expenses incurred in promoting league activities that do not come specifically under Membership, Finance, Veter Service, or Educational activities or Position Support.
- C. Delegates, travel, and affiliations. National Conventions even years, State Conventions odd years. Regional workshops are conducted every year by the State League. Amount budgeted covers travel expense for these attending and babysitting fees.
- D. Financial support for LWV organization.
  - 1. Support for state and national services. Paid to State League. A part of this amount is sent to the national league by the state league.
  - 2. National per member payment. Based on the number of members as of January 1st of each year. Amount is decided by each national convention.   - 2. Program committees. Impartial study and impartial community activities may be budgeted here. The cost of committee research, including impartial mimocgraphed material, may be budgeted here if arrangement is made to distribute such material to the public as well as to League members.
  - 3. Voters Service.
    - a. Voters guides includes all publications giving information to voters, including candidates questionnaires and programs for candidates meetings.
    - b. Candidates Meetings. Cost of room restals and other expense of meeting.
    - c. Yearly Voters Directory. Cost of publishing and distribution.
- G. Position support.
  - 1. Publications purchase, production and distribution in support of League positions.
  - 2. Expenses of all League activities which touch upon consensus and League positions. Activity involved with changing the law or creating new laws; expenses of travel to state legislature; entertainment for officials; campaigns; newspaper ads; public meetings; committee expenses which cannot be included in Section F..

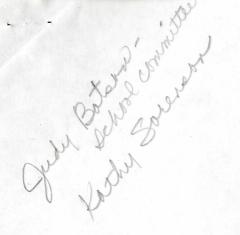
