





Business Education: Financial Knowledge



The Guidance Department also offers exploratory teaching and vocational training which can aid students in choosing their jobs for the future.










Industrial Arts: Man And Machine

You!", directed at those of the cast who failed to make either the apropriate entrance or utter the correct lines.

The set, a tin-foil masterpiece, consisted of a variety of ramps, stairs, and stools placed strategically on stage and in the area in front of the audience. These objects, plus a few props, became the scenes of great moments in history. The garden of Eden, Bunker Hill, the rolling prairie of the newly opening West, whatever was needed to recreate a particular time in history.

An unconventional play, an unconventional set and an unconventional method of presentation combined to make three unconventional evenings, the 27th, 28th and 29th of October.

"When I was in Chile and found out I was commong to the United States, many things crossed my mind. I thought mostly about the youth here and what they would be like. Well now I am here and there is something about them that is unique. They are much freer here than Chile. They have more chances to get good paying jobs, and can live much better. The parents don't jobs that take them away from the children a lot. In Chile the parents' jobs don't have set hours or times and this is bad for family life. I don't know if I just got lucky, or if every family here is the same, but my American family is wonderful to me. The people have much more opportunities for a higher standard of living. I have been here for three months so far and haven't seen anything that horrible. The poverty I see every day of my life in Chile is much worse than any I know of Here. We, the youth of Chile have more of a chance to live better than our parents.

The food is different, but there is really no way to describe it except to say that here I find myself pouring on the salt. The food is so blan!!


